Katimavik crew wants to get to know Acton's people

Eight young people involved with the Katimavik program are looking for billets in Acton next month so they can become more involved with the community.

Group leader Maryse La Fleur, from Quebec, said this most recent group have come here from a successful Katimavik program in the Yukon where they built a children's playground.

This is the second rotation of Katimavik youths in North Halton this year. The first crew was busy working for the Halton Region Conservation Authority digging at Crawford Lake. This group will start on the construction of an old Indian village and will be here until Christmas.

One of the goals of Katimavik is for the young people to be integrated into the community and since they are renting a home at RR2 Rockwood west of Acton, they want to become involved in Acton.

The young people, ranging in age between 17 and 21, are going to help Y instructors with programs and make presentations at Acton High School about Katimavik and their experiences in the Yukon.

They hope to be billeted at Acton homes for two weeks, November 6 to 20, and share the lives and work of the local families. The billet families will receive \$6 a day to cover lodging.

Katimavik is also inviting charity organizations which need help with projects in the evenings or weekends to contact them. They also hope to get to know the young people of Acton.

Four of the young people, Jeff High, Jim Brown, Colin Price and Loraine Comeau are from Ontario while Denise Lissel and Cindy Johnson are from Saskatchewan. Joanne Paiment and Nicole Sevigny came from Quebec.

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No action on overnight parking exemptions yet

Lifting the three hour overnight parking limit for some streets will be dealt with by Halton Hills council this winter and changes won't be implemented until next spring.

Engineer Robert Austin said councillors were asked to supply a list of streets where the three hour parking limit might be waived, and names were supplied. He said the list is being reviewed now in conjunction with work being done on the consolidation of old traffic bylaws.

He said removing the overnight parking ban on some streets is something which won't be implemented until next spring.

The issue was raised Monday night at Halton Hills council by Councillor Dave Whiting who collected a list of about 20 Acton streets on which residents wanted the parking limit lifted earlier this year. Whiting's call for overnight parking to be allowed spring, summer and fall and prohibited only during the winter to facilitate snow plowing was rejected by council this past summer. At that time Austin suggested some streets where the overnight parking ban causes severe problems for residents could be exempted from the law.

Whiting informed council Monday police have been quite active handing out overnight parking tickets recently.
