He said he wants to ask local business and industry what they think should be done, feeling they've been "kicked in the face"

### Ross Knechtel

Councillors and staff are the agents of the public and it's their job to purchase services like road re-pairs and garbage collection in the best time for the best price for the residents, Knechtel explained.

A councillor must be able to "play poker" with the councillors from Esquesing and Georgetown to obtain support for things Acton wants and needs. Doing your homework helps a councillor play the game of give and take with other areas.

Knechtel said the last proposal to council on the town hall involved the municipality donating only the \$40,000 set aside to demolish the hall to the restoration fund, not a quarter million dollars in tax money going to restoration. He said the restored town hall could be municipal offices and save money now spent on renting space at the Y.

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# Aggregate Foundation's view supports tough Town stance

Halton Hills has received some additional support and possibly ammunition for the fight against the proposed aggregate land freeze of 14,000 acres.

Monday night a report from the Toronto based

Foundation for Aggregate Studies, as well as com-ments from the Township of North Dumfries (near Cambridge), were referred to the planner for in-clusion in a report due for the November 22 meeting of council.

Last week passage of a number of recommendations and comments to be sent to Queen's Park and the region suggested by Councillor Pam. Sheldon was delayed pending the planner's report which should add weight to the Town's tough stance. There seems no question though, that Sheldon's recommendations and comments will be endorsed since there was considerable support

The Foundation for Aggregate Studies takes a tough stand against the province on the subject of the Ministry of Natural Resources' (MNR) "series of reports and mappings requiring the appropriation of one-half million acres of Central

Ontario land for gravel mining, in direct contravention of current cabinet policy permitting municipalities to plan for land use."

Commenting on the report, retiring Esquesing councillor George Maltby said it shows Halton Hills isn't the only area "getting the shaft" and there is considerable concern about the province's

While he won't be around for the "fight", Malthy urged the new council "take up the cause" and make sure "justice" prevails.

He said he didn't feel it was appropriate for Halt to leave the battle against Queen's Park in the region's hand noting while there will be strong representation from north Halton in the delegation taking Halton's stand to the province, it will be "watered down" by representation from south Halton. He said he was challenging the next council to make sure Halton Hills views are heard.

The Foundation for Aggregate Studies report states the Mineral Aggregate Policy for Official Plans contained in provincial reports and maps showing deposits has not received cabinet approval, does not conform to normal provincial planning mechanisms and isn't endorsed by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing as required under the proposed new Planning Act.

The report says up to 50 per cent of some areas, including Halton Hills, "are being requisitioned for future gravel mining. The policy negates any type of future residential, commercial or industrial development."

"What it means is that if you wanted to build a home on a 50 acre lot in these designated lands, it would not be permitted," Foundation chairman John Alexander said.

"Critics object that the MNR's estimated 30 per cent increase in gravel demand is grossly exag-


gerated. Alexander maintains "that there is no conceivable way the Province could use that much gravel in the next 18 years". He points out that the reports provide conclusive evidence that Ontario already has more than enough gravel in existing licenced pits to last well into the next century, even if the forecasts are accurate.

"The Ministry claims that aggregate (gravel) supplies are scarce, and that it is uneconomical to supply the market from a distance of over 50 miles. Yet the \$250,000 study on which these conclusions were based was later criticized as being "based on unrealistic and extreme assump-(Continued on page 6)
