Police beat

Hallowe'en vandalism down

Halton Regional Police report Hallowe'en this year was quieter than usual. The 747 Restaurant on Mill Street was damaged when eggs were thrown at the building Saturday night. After a chase from Main Street to 1 km. north of Halton Road 43 a 46-year-old Acton lady was charged with mischief on Church Street when he threw an egg at a police car. A police car was damaged on Sunday at 2:20 a.m. when a rock was thrown at the car at the corner of Main and Mill Streets. The hood of the car was dented causing \$50 damage. A car parked in the laneway of an RFB Acton home sustained \$200 damage on Friday when the vinyl roof was ripped, two emblems on the car were damaged and the license plate was painted. Caravan Trailer Rentals, Commerce Court, was broken into sometime between Friday and Monday. Entry was gained by removing an exhaust fan from an upper window. \$1,400 in welding equipment and tools were stolen. Warren Contracting Ltd., Commerce Court, was broken into sometime between Friday and Monday. A device called a Tifur Unit used to pull beams together was stolen. The unit was valued at \$500. Police report a break and enter at a home on the First Line, Naasagaweya, on Wednesday, October 27, between 4 and 8 p.m. There was no sign of forced entry. \$3,000 in jewelry, stereo equipment and a T.V. were stolen. Thirty windows at the Acton High School were covered in soap around 9:20 p.m. on Friday night. Three juveniles are being questioned. There was a report of a common assault on Bower Avenue at 4:17 a.m. on Sunday. No charges were laid at 2 p.m. Tuesday, October 26 and 12 noon Wednesday, October 27. The bike was valued at \$150. An Eden Mills man was charged with impaired driving on Thursday, while driving on Highway 7, West of Acton, at 12:30 a.m. At 10:30 p.m. on Tuesday, October 26, Halton Regional Police were called to a domestic dispute on Churchill Rd. South in Acton. There were no injuries or damage reported. A 23 year old Elora man was charged with break and enter on Thursday at the Acton Legion on Wright Street. Halton Regional Police found the man hiding inside the Legion with cash and cigarettes. A battery was stolen from a car parked on Queen St. sometime between October 23 and 26. It was worth \$80. Police laid two charges of driving with open liquor in the car in Acton, one at 1:50 a.m. and the other at 2 a.m. on October 27. Two purses containing about \$24 cash were stolen at a dance at Acton High School on October 23. Police have solved how thieves got into Ed's In 'N Out recently and escaped with \$1,400 in cash and cheques without leaving any sign of forced entry. Sometime between October 23 and 26 burglars forced the metal door of the Looking Glass next door to Ed's. Once inside they removed ceiling tiles and a light fixture to crawl into Ed's. Police recovered a car belonging to an Acton resident which had been stolen in Georgetown on October 23. The car was recovered in Peel Region around 8:30 a.m. on October 24.

22 dogs destroyed

During September, 22 dogs were destroyed, a drop of 16 from the same month last year. The figures in the report from Joe Kirley, Halton Hills Animal Control Officer, show 40 dogs impounded in September '82, compared to 52 in the previous September. Sixteen dogs were reclaimed, while a year ago in the same month only 11 were reclaimed. A total of 312 calls were answered in September and so far this year, until the end of September 2,505 licences were sold. This is 94 less than last year.

Council opposes Union Gas hike

An increase in rates sought by Union Gas Limited is not popular with Halton Hills council. Councillor Harry Levy claimed Union Gas was trying to hide the fact the 4.4 per cent increase they mentioned would come after certain automatic adjustments which really would be the increase to 11 per cent. He urged council to send a resolution to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario protesting the proposed increase and stressing the disregard for the federal and provincial guidelines. Council endorsed the motion unanimously. Councillor Marilyn Serjeantson noted her gas bill was \$400 a year when she moved into her house and now it is \$130 a month for every month of the year. "If council upped taxes like that we'd be raked over the coals."
