



During September, 22 dogs were destroyed, a drop of 16 from the same month last year.

The figures in the report from Joe Kirley, Halton Hills Animal Control Officer, show 40 dogs impounded in September '82, compared to 52 in the previous September. Sixteen dogs were reclaimed, while a year ago in the same month only 11 were reclaimed.

A total of 312 calls were answered in September and so far this year, until the end of September 2,505 licences were sold. This is 94 less than last

Council opposes **Union Gas hike**

An increase in rates sought by Union Gas Limited is not popular with Halton Hills council. Councillor Harry Levy claimed Union Gas was trying to hide the fact the 4.4 per cent increase they mentioned would come after certain automatic adjustments which really would being the

increase to 11 per cent. He urged council to send a resolution to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario protesting the proposed increase and stressing the disregard for the federal and provincial guidelines.

Council endorsed the motion unanimously. Councillor Marilyn Serjeantson noted her gas bill was \$400 a year when she moved into her house and now it is \$130 a month for every month of the year. "If council upped taxes like that we'd be raked over the coals."


