"The MNR at Queen's Park has directed its local planning districts to implement a strategy of appropriation and tonnage targets. This is in spite of the fact that local MNR planners have not had the opportunity to analyze the demand forecasts and tonnage targets assigned to their districts."

"This policy of government by administrative directive has been going on in the Ministry for the last three years," Alexander noted, adding land use rights of municipalities have been "pre-empted by this disastrous policy."

He noted municipal politicians "are literally being forced, in isolation, to include excessive gravel acreages without knowledge of the entire provincial gravel targets, or operational methods."

Alexander urged residents whose land would be frozen contact their local planning departments and the local Ministry of Natural Resources District Office (for this area in Cambridge).

He concluded "municipalities still have the power to decide land use in their boundaries."

Guelph firm wins contract bid for Kingham sewers

A Guelph construction firm will be hired by the region to construct a sanitary sewer on Kingham Rd., it was decided last Wednesday.

The recommendation to have Goetz and Prior Construction Ltd., do the work on Kingham Rd. goes before council for approval Wednesday (today).

The 200 mm diameter sanitary sewer will cost the region \$97,952, the lowest price offered. Highest bid was \$375,356 from Roseway Construction Ltd. in Downsview.

Eight others offered prices ranging from about \$100,000 to \$300,000.

"Just as an off the cuff remark," asked Burlington councillor Steve Toth, "how can a firm offer four times the price of another? Are these really bonified tenders?"

Bob Moore the director of public works, explained that some contractors offered low priced because they were "desperate" for work. "And, of course, the Guelph bidder is much closer," he added.

Public Works maintenance employee Bruce Kitchen said the situation in Acton accounted for the range in prices.

"What you're dealing with in Acton is wet, silty soil and a certain amount of risk to do the job," he explained. "So different contractors will assess the risk differently."

After Toth asked committee if they were satisfied that the firm had the expertise to do the job, the recommendation was passed.

Book Nook is in Wintario half-back

Ontario residents can now save up to 50 per cent of the cost on virtually any Canadian book by turning their non-winning Wintario tickets into cash. Queen's Park has announced.

This latest chapter in the Wintario half-back program began November 1 and allows buyers substantial discounts on Canadian authored books at close to 400 bookstore across the province, including the Book Nook in Acton.

Non-winning Wintario tickets from the October 28 draw onward take on a value of 50 cents each for a discount of up to half the cost of a Canadian authored book, or up to \$15, whichever is less. For example, if a book costs \$12 as many as \$6 worth of tickets, a total of 12, can be applied against the purchase price. On the other hand, if a book costs more than \$30, the maximum rebate will be \$15. Customers simply write their name and address on the back of one Wintario ticket and present them to a participating retailer when buying a book.
