Here's here letter: "My way of introduction, I am a member of the McLean Family who used to own a farm on the Fifth Line. My father was Rev. Hector McLean, missionary to China.

"I am working on a book, 'The World Was My Home.' The first chapters will deal with 'roots,' Hebrides, Canada and Sweden.

"My great grandparents, McLeans and McKinnons were from Islay and Mull. From what I understand, they settled in the area of Erin Township, Wellington County. Unfortunately, I have no personal records beyond a few items re: grandparents, Donald and Sarah McLean and grand aunts who also lived on the Fifth Line, McEachern Farm.

"Those of us who are descendants of the early pioneer settlers, can feel proud of the qualities of will and determination to face overwhelming odds and hardship. Their crafts and skills were vital in the development of the new areas. They gave rather than expected, as so many entering Canada do now. That is why I am so interested in obtaining info not only about my own forbears, but also those with whom they shared pioneering and conditions of that early time."
