

Wagner suspension controversy rages on

Facts are facts, there were no fabrications in article

Free Press Sports Reporter I am writing this article in response to the letter written by Steve Yaroschak, president of the Acton Minor Hockey Association (AMHA). Mr. Yaroschak feels my knowledge of the suspension is "obviously vague" and the term "goon town" was my own fabrication.

To start I'd like to say that my knowledge of hockey and the rules of the Ontario Minor Hockey Association (OMHA) are up to date, since I've played hockey in Acton for 20 years, coached and been a director on the AMHA for the previous four years.

The example used by Steve was fine if it had happened on the ice and there had of been a game report handed into the OMHA.

First it was not a game situation, he did not receive a match penalty and there was no referee's report handed in on this situation. If it "Steve is practising.

had happened on the ice Wagner or any other player would have probably received two to four games at the most from the OMHA, not two months.

The term "goon town" was no fabrication, it was a quote from Steve Yaroschak in a telephone interview. I am not in the habit of writing fabrication, just facts.

I still feel the suspension was too stiff and since the AMHA changed their stand on the suspension and lowered it to one mornth and have allowed Wagner to start practicing at once. I have to assume they too felt the suspension was too severe.

Just to let you know I do know the rules, and if you're going by "the book", an OMHA suspended player is not allowed to practice with his team, until the suspension is over.

Father unhappy with appeal

This letter to the OMHA was filed with the Free Press for publication. Dear Sir:

I would like to appeal the ruling handed down by the Acton Minor Hockey Association Executive concerning the suspension of Steven Wagner. We appealed their ruling, and the Hearing took place in Acton on Tuesday, November 9, 1982, at 7.30 p.m. At this hearing, the Executive was represented by Steve Yaroschak, Robert Smith and Herb Dodds.

Mr. Dodds was highly audible in his opnions and views concerning the suspension, However, I understand that Mr. Dodds is not an elected member of the Executive.

Originally, Steven was suspended until January 1, 1983, The suspension was shortened

to December 1, 1982, with Steven being allowed

to practise with his fearn at the present time. It

was voiced at the hearing that the December date was more acceptable because Acton will be finished playing Galt by that date, Galt being the team which was involved in the infrac-

This ruling seems to me to be unjust. The Executive in effect is saying that if Acton was through playing Galt for the season then the suspension would have been lifted. The Executive has found Steven guilty to a degree, he has paid the price by being suspended for a time, but because of the dates of the schedule he has to sit out more games because of a possibility of another confrontation with Galt. That's being punished for what may happen in the
