The minutes of the past meeting were read by Mrs. H. Bayne, assistant secretary treasurer in the absence of Mrs. J. Ramsey, secretary-treasurer. The treasurer's report was also presented by Mrs. H. Bayne. The usual business routine followed. The Pot Luck Supper held at Aberfoyle Hall, November 2, was well attended. Reference was made to the two competitions to be held at the Ploughing Match at Teviotville, near Walkerton in 1984. The two competitive classes are painting and a quilt depicting the theme, Heritage of Wellington County.

The report of the Area Convention at Arthur, October 21 and 22 was given. Mrs. B. LeRoy

reported on the activities of day one.

Four hundred and fifty-four people registered October 21. Emphasis was focussed on the Founders of the Women's Institutes on February 19, 1897, 85 years ago. The list was as follows: Mrs. Adelaide Hoodless, Co-Founder; Mrs. E.D. Smith, first president; Mr. Erland Lee, Co-Founder; Mrs. Charles Macoun, first FWIO Secretary; Mrs. William Todd first FWIO President.

Consideration was given to the twinning of provinces in the form of pen-pals. Manitoba is suggested to be Ontario's twin. On December 1 and 2 members are invited to attend a Christmas party at the Erland Lee Home in Stoney Creek. A pamphlet was circulated on Food System Prices—information for the best possible value for you in "Kit" form which can be obtained.

The following Resolutions were passed, the gist of which were: (a) Abolition of Global Warfare and Dis-

armament (b) Emphasis on Human Survival. Mrs. Bernice B. Noblitt, newly elected President of FWIC at the National Convention held in Fredericton N.B. June, 1982, gave an inspiring address. She proposes District Projects and Area Projects. A question to ponder over is: "Are branches changing with the times?"

The report for day two, prepared by Mrs. J. Ramsey, delegate, and read by Mrs. H. Bayne, was also most interesting. The beautiful "Hymn of All Nations"—tune "Finlandia" by Jean Sibelius was rendered. 104,000 people took adult courses in the first week of October, 1982. Supporters for all projects in connection with Farm Safety was voiced. A new handbook is available soon.
