

New centre will aid special cases

A Centre for Self-Reliant Learning will be set up at Lord Elgin High School in Burlington, by the Halton Board of Education.

Thursday night trustees approved the establishment of the school which would cater to the needs of special students. The school will be in a separate wing of an existing school, and although it will utilize the services of present board teaching staff, it is not expected to cost any more than the salary of a part-time secretary.

The Centre would cater to students with certain emotional, economic, social or environmental situations which prevent them from completing their diploma or working to their maximum potential. Students with commitments to sports, or jobs, or with medical problems who cannot be at school full-time would be eligible for the centre, as would the learner who benefits better from individual attention, or those with a large-school phobia.

Trustee Dick Howitt, Esquensing, questioned the cost of the centre. He pointed out the teachers are coming from a system with declining enrolment, and thus the school board is retaining teachers who have been, or will be declared surplus. This in itself was spending money. Bob Dixon, superintendent of programming pointed out there will be more men and women returning to school which would increase the enrolment. Cam Jackson, Burlington, said he supported the centre, if it was set up in Oakville, where there is consid-

erable unemployment. He also noted "we (the board) are involved in program expansion when we should be program contraction."

Jackson also hinted that the board would be asking for an 18 to 20 per cent increase in taxes next year if the board continues expanding programs.

Georgetown trustee Betty Fisher wondered what would happen to the present staff at Lord Elgin. Dixon admitted

there could be a morale problem at that school because some of the teachers will be declared surplus. Fisher contended "We are taking one group and treating them one way and another group treating them another way."

The Centre will be opened in September, 1983, with a minimum enrolment of 90 and a maximum of 200, and will be monitored annually and evaluated in three years.

Bastos had his back to the train when he was hit. Police say he was bush hunting and was carrying two rabbits he had bagged when he was struck.

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills intends to apply to The Ontario Municipal Board pursuant to the provisions of Section 39 of The Planning Act for approval of By-law 82-83 passed on the 1st day of March 1982. A copy of the by-law is furnished herewith and a note giving an explanation of the purpose and effect of the by-law and stating the lands affected thereby is also furnished herewith.

ANY PERSON INTERESTED MAY, within twenty-one (21) days after the date of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the clerk of the Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills notice of objection to approval of the said by-law or part thereof giving details of all or the portion of the by-law to which you object and detailed reasons therefor, and shall indicate that if a hearing is held the objector or an agent will attend at the hearing to support the objection.

ANY PERSON wishing to support the application for approval of the by-law may within twenty-one (21) days after the date of this notice send by registered mail or deliver to the clerk of the Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills notice of his support of approval of the said by-law together with a request for notice of any hearing that may be held giving also the name and address to which such notice should be given.

THE ONTARIO MUNICIPAL BOARD may approve of the said by-law but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objection to the by-law will be considered. Notice of any hearing that may be held will be given only to persons who have filed an objection or notice of support and who have left with or delivered to the clerk undersigned, the address to which notice of hearing is to be sent and, similarly, to any person who has filed a request for a change in the provisions of the by-law.

THE LAST DATE FOR FILING OBJECTIONS will be December 15th, 1982. DATED at the Town of Halton Hills this 24th day of November, 1982.

BY-LAW NO. 82-23

BEING a By-law to amend Restricted Area (Zoning) By-law No. 74-51, as amended by the Town of Halton Hills.

WHEREAS Council is empowered to enact this By-law by virtue of the provisions of Section 39 and The Planning Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 379, as amended; AND WHEREAS the Subsidiary Planning Board has recommended to Council that Restricted Area (Zoning) By-law No. 74-51, as amended, be amended as hereinafter set out; AND WHEREAS said recommendation conforms to the terms and intent of the Official Plan of the former Esquensing Planning Area; NOW THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS ENACTS THE FOLLOWING:

- Section 6.1 of Restricted Area (Zoning) By-law No. 74-51, as amended, of the Town of Halton Hills (Esquensing) is hereby amended by deleting sub-section (e) Recreational and the uses contained therein as permitted uses within the Rural (RU) Zone.
- Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this By-law, any use, building or structure existing at the date of the passing of this By-law and permitted in accordance with the provisions of Section 6.1 (e) of said By-law No. 74-51, as amended, are deemed to conform to the provisions of Section 6.1 of said By-law 74-51.
- Notwithstanding the provision of Section 2 of this By-law, any enlargement or expansion of a use, building or structure permitted in accordance with said Section 2 of this By-law shall require approval as provided for in Section 49 of The Planning Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 379.
- This By-law shall become effective from and after the date of passing hereof, subject to the approval of the Ontario Municipal Board.

THIS BY-LAW READ A FIRST, SECOND AND THIRD TIME AND FINALLY PASSED THIS 1st DAY OF March, 1982.

EXPLANATORY NOTE PURPOSE OF THE BY-LAW

The purpose of By-law 82-23 is to amend the "Rural" designated permitted uses by removing recreational, picnic areas and parks. It is also the purpose of the By-law to recognize any use, building or structure existing at the date of enactment of By-law 82-23, which exists in accordance with the provisions of the existing By-law 74-51, as amended, Section 6.1, however, enlargements or expansion of a use, building or structure will require municipal approvals under Section 49 of The Planning Act, R.S.O. 1980.

EFFECT OF THE BY-LAW

The effect of the By-law is to recognize all existing legal recreational uses within the "Rural" designated lands in the municipality, and to provide for their orderly and controlled expansion or enlargement. The By-law would also prohibit any future recreational land uses in the "Rural" designated lands without prior approval of the municipality.

LOCATION OF THE LANDS AFFECTED

The lands affected by this By-law are all lands designated "Rural" in the existing Zoning By-law 74-51, as amended.

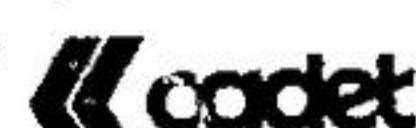

Halton was represented well in the Queen's Guineas Competition at the Royal Winter Fair on Friday, November 19. It is a market steer conformation competition open to senior Ontario 4-H members. John Willmott of Saskatchewan, formerly of Halton County, was the show judge.

David Lasby had Halton's top entry, a Shorthorn which placed Reserve Champion in the Hereford-Shorthorn Class. This steer later sold for \$2.00 per pound.

Paul Wilkinson, Heather Lasby, Lorie Parsons, and Leanne Parsons all placed in the first prize group in the Aberdeen Angus class. Jodie Stult placed in the first prize group in the Crossbred and Other Breeds Class, while Gerry Clarke placed in the top section of the first prize group. Stephen Lasby placed in the top section of the Simmental-Cross Class.

The steers were all sold at an auction sale in the afternoon. The winner was a Limousin-Cross steer exhibited by John Nonstadt of Essex County. The steer weighing 1160 lbs. sold for \$12.50 per pound.

Currently, Halton police spend approximately \$232,000 per year on training, according to Reeve. By not having an officer training for two weeks, it would reduce the cost "significantly," said Reeve. "It's a big savings, but we have to start immediately," he said.
