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

BEING a By-law'to amend Restricted Area (Zoning) By-law No. 74-51, as amended by the Town of Hal-WHEREAS Council is empowered to enect this By-

law by virtue of the provisions of Section 39 and The Planning Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 379, as amended; AND WHEREAS the Subsidiary Planning Board has recommended to Council that Restricted Area (Zoning) By-law No. 74-51, as amended, be amended as hereinafter set out;

AND WHEREAS said recommendation conforms to the terms and intent of the Official Plan of the former Esquesing Planning Area: NOW THEREFORE, THE COUNCIL OF THE COR-

PORATION OF THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS **FNACTS THE FOLLOWING:**

Section 8.1 of Restricted Area (Zoning) By-law No. 74-51, as amended, of the Town of Halton Hills (Esquesing) is hereby amended by deleting sub-section (e) Recreational and the uses contained therein as permitted uses within the Hursi (HU) Zone.

Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this By-law, any use, building or structure existing at the date of the passing of this. Bylaw and permitted in accordance with the provisions of Section 6.1 (a) of said By low No. 74-51, as amended, are deemed to conform to the

provisions of Section 6.1 of said By-law 74-51. Notwithstanding the provision of Section 2 of this By-law, any enlargement or expansion of a use, building or structure permitted in accordance with said Section 2 of this By-law shall require approval as provided for in Section 49 of The Planning Act, R.S.O. 1980, c. 379.

This By-law shall become effective from and after the date of passing hereof, subject to the approval of the Ontario Municipal Board.

THIS BY-LAW READ A FIRST, SECOND AND THIRD TIME AND FINALLY PASSED THIS 1st DAY OF March , 1982.

EXPLANATORY NOTE **PURPOSE OF THE BY-LAW**

The purpose of By-law 82-23 is to amend the "Rurat" designated permitted uses by removing recreational, picnic areas and parks. It is also the purpose of the By-law to recognize any use, building or structure existing at the date of enactment of Bylaw 82-23, which exists in accordance with the provisions of the existing By-law 74-51, as amended, Section 6.1, however, enlargements or expansion or a use, building or structura will require municipal spprovals under Section 49 of The Planning Act, R.S.O. 1980.

EFFECT OF THE BY-LAW

The effect of the By-lew is to recognize all existing legal recreational uses within the "flural" designated lands in the municipality, and to provide for their The By-law would also prohibit any future recreational land uses in the "Rural" designated lands without prior approval of the municipality.

LOCATION OF THE LANOS AFFECTED

The lands affected by this By-law are all lands designeted "Rural" in the existing Zoning By-lew 74-51, as amended.
