Fisher relishes new job

The road to vice chairman of the Halton Board of Education has been a long, hard haul for Georgetown's Betty Fisher but one that has got

her adrenalin pumping.

Fisher was familiar to the board even before her first election four years ago, when she was part of the Renaissance group. Her first taste of politics came in 1978 when s'he defeated incumbent Bert Hinton in the race for the Acton/Esquesing seat on the board. In 1980 she switched seats and now represents Georgetown. She went to Burlington with a purpose, and is now seeing her work brought to fruition.

Besides all the regional board's committees, such as salary, staff and advisory committees, Fisher also has made quite a name for herself on the powerful ALSBO (Association of Large School Boards of Ontario) and OSTC (Ontario School Trustee Council) both at the provincial level.

ALSBO is made privy to policy decisions in the Ministry before they are made public to the school boards, and are given a chance to respond to the various documents.

Fisher is on the executive of ALSBO and is chairman of the curriculum committee. She is also on the executive council for the Ontario Association for curriculum development council, She is an alternative director for OSTC.

Even though her duties as vice chairman will mean many more hours in Burlington, Fisher will continue her term on ALSBO and OSTC. Her election to vice chairman is for one year.

Fisher estimates she spends from 20 to 40 hours a week on the job at meetings. With an annual salary of \$7,200, it works out an average of \$5 an hour, based on a 30 hour week. And that estimated time does not include the five to 10 hours she spends talking on the telephone to constituents.

But she knew before she was elected the job would take that many hours away from her life. She admits that not all trustees have to devote so many hours to the job, and that had she been employed, she would never have been able to sit on ALSBO. She has had some days when she had five meetings in one day.

But she gets Sundays off, she says.

The recently released Secondary Education Review from the Ministry is probably coming more into the line of how she felt education should be before she became a trustee, she says about the provincial decision to phase out grade 13 and get back to basics.

"Things are going off the rail with too much innovation," she warned, "and kids are not having the basic education. This will make sure the kids going into university, college and the job market will be well prepared."

Fisher says she is a "real trustee advocator" and feels the board is where the power should be, rather than the staff. She is optimistic this is happening now.

Fisher feels her role as vice chairman, assisting chairman Len Auger, is to help the trustees see more facets of education in order to get involved.
