Two Barrie teenagers were sentenced to four months in jail after pleading guilty to stealing about \$1,000 worth of garments from the old Hide House, last summer.

William Fisher, 17, and Barry Cummings, 18, have been in custody since their arrest last August. Their sentence is on top of the four months they have already served. Judge Douglas Latimer said in Milton Provincial Court recently.

Judge Latimer noted the youths had committed the theft while under probation, and it was the second such offence they had been involved in while on probation. He disregarded pleas on behalf of Fisher that he should be released into his mother's custody.

Fisher was also given an extra month in jail for assault causing bodily harm. He pleaded guilty to hitting an apartment superintendent in the face, which resulted in four stitches to his nose.

The pair cut a screen window of the old Hide House, August 24, touching off a secret alarm, the court heard during their trial. They took about \$1,000 worth of clothing.
