Grants totalling \$289,000 from the federal and provincial governments have been announced for the Halton Region Conservation Authority for three separate projects. The largest grants, \$170,000 is designed for a flood-line mapping project on Sixteen Mile Creek in Halton Hills, Milton and Oakville. The project will be implemented under the Canada Ontario Food Damage Reduction Program and involves the analysis of Sixteen Mile Creek and determination of regional storm flood operations. Total cost is estimated at \$195,000.

A grant of \$81,375 from the province is to assist with improvements to the field operations centre of the Authority at the Mountsberg Conservation Area for construction of additional storage space, staff parking area, fuel handling facility and other improvements. Total cost is estimated at \$150,000.

Halton Region Authority will also receive a grant from the province of \$7,125 to assist in the purchase of additional Niagara Escarpment lands. The subject project is located near existing Authority landholdings in the Crawford Forest Area. The property is 19.2 hectares (47.6 acres) in size and consists of a combination of unique geological features, abandoned waterfowl and escarpment forest. In addition, a small lake and associated wetland situated on the property serve as a source area for Limestone Creek, a significant coldwater stream.



Out doors

Ontario anglers have just received a great Christmas present from Alan Pope that is sure going to please each and every one.

In a pig's eye it is! The M.N.R. minister has just signed over to the Indian people of Ontario most of what he was appointed to protect in the first place.

This document gives native Indians exclusive rights to commercial and most sport-fishing in Zone 1, which takes in all of southern Ontario water including lakes Simcoe, Huron, Erie and Ontario plus southern Georgian Bay where no commercial fishing whatsoever should be allowed.

You can bet your bottom dollar that plenty of commercial fishing will now take place in Lake Simcoe where it has been prohibited for a long time. Give the Indians about two years to clean out the Lake Trout. What a laugh when you will have to pay the band council on Georgina Island for the right to fish Lake Simcoe.

I personally believe that native people, not just the card carrying Indians who live in inland areas of the far north, should have the right to hunt, trap and fish commercially on a small scale in order to supplement their limited means of income in the immediate areas of their homes. But not over the whole area that at present is covered by Area number 1 in southern Ontario, plus darn near all of our far north.

Many times I have wondered why so many people on reservations in the northern areas where small lakes are abundant with Whitefish, Pickerell and Pike go hungry and without money. One man with a hand line only, especially when ice fishing, could realize at least 100 pounds of fish, which at current prices less costs of transportation should leave about \$50 for a day's work without hurting the fisheries one bit.

This has not happened however, and I do not believe that more give ways by the Ontario government will ever change the fact. It will only serve to further antagonize the sports minded people of this province against spearing, netting and trapping of sports fish, especially Pickerell, Rainbow Trout and Salmon. Where Salmon and Trout are stocked it is for recreation purposes, not for meat shipping to Boston fish markets.

All out war will be waged against this unjust piece of bad legislation that was quietly put through without any input from the average people of this province. Input should have been heard from sportsmen and cottage owners, many of who will be prohibited from fishing from their own docks.

A good many anglers were out on the last day of 1982 to close out the extended season on many rivers, with limited success due to high water conditions. This high water at this time of year should make for good clean rivers at opening time this coming spring.

The Ministry of Natural Resources has just charged two fish hogs from Hamilton with possession of 52 Rainbow Trout that were caught in the Southampton area.

Joel Tost, formerly of Georgetown and now an MNR officer, worked very hard to gather evidence and lay charges in this case. Keep up the good work Joel.

There's very little news as yet on the ice fishing as conditions are poor so far, with ice only on small lakes north of the Bay. Give it at least two more weeks for any appreciable amount of ice this year.
