Demolition ends 109 years service

When the Rockwood School Annex on Guelph St. was demolished recently, 109 years of educational facilities at this site came to an end. Last June (1982) pupils and teachers, Mrs. Sue Meadows and Mrs. Marie Watson, left the school for the last time.

When school enrolment became too great for this site, Rockwood Centennial School was built on Pasmore St. in 1967. The following year the original six room school was demolished leaving the two room addition, which was in use until 1982.

The first Rockwood Public School was built on this site in 1873 and was at first a one storey structure. In 1930 a second storey was added and the two room addition was built in 1957. In 1921 a Continuation or High School was established in the same building and operated there for 25 years. After that the

Eramosa council has purchased the site and transferred it to the Eramosa Non-Profit Housing Corporation for a 26 unit Senior Citizen apartment complex.

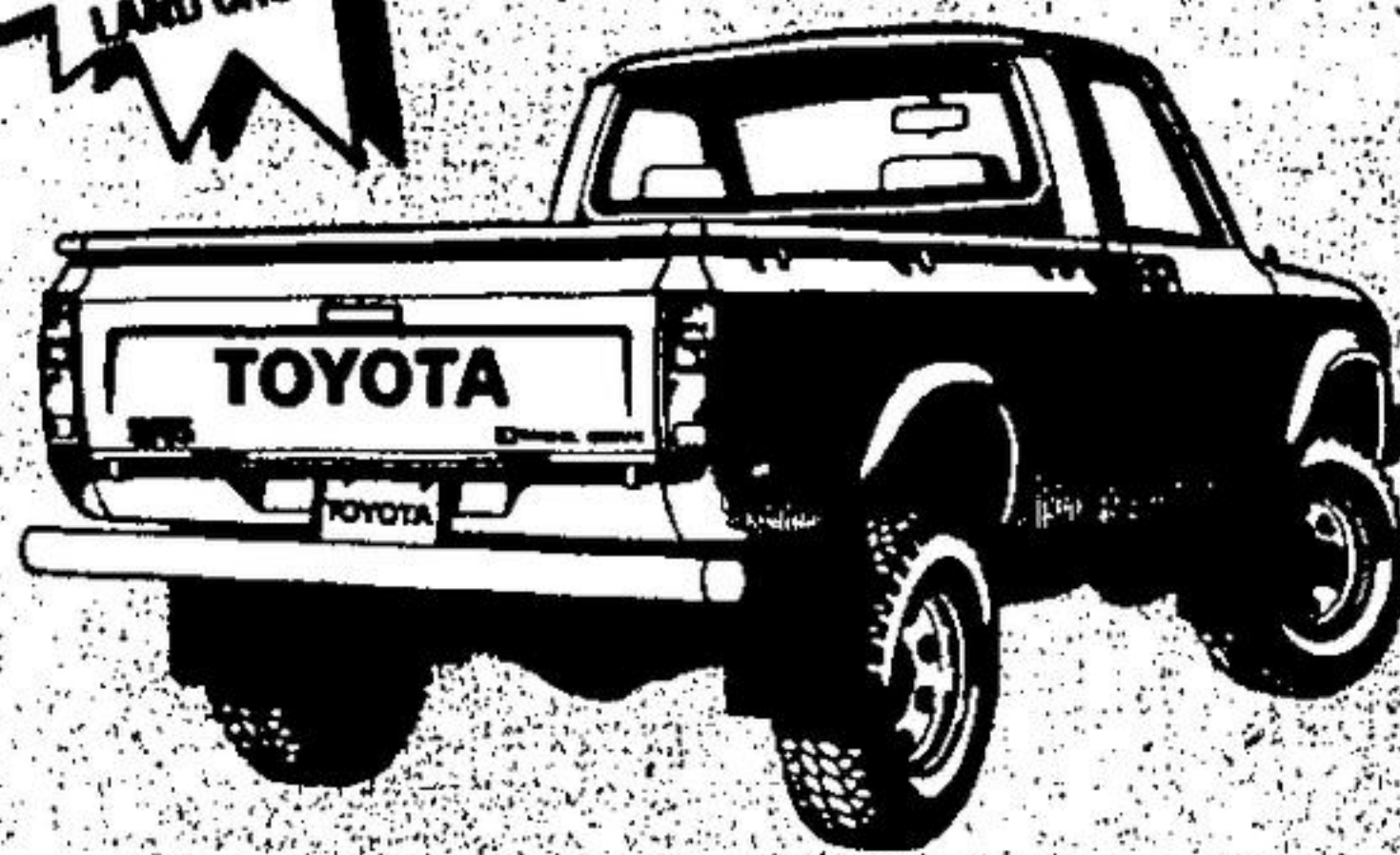
