Three attempted break-ins at Glenlea plaza

Halton Regional Police are investigating three attempted break-ins at the Glenlea Plaza. The rear doors of Royal Variety and Honey Pot Nursery were tampered with. Entry was not gained. The attempted break-ins took place overnight Sunday to Monday. Police are investigating an attempted break and enter at the Glenlea Medical Centre sometime between 5 and 10 p.m.

Sunday. Vise grips were used on the front door, but the attempt was unsuccessful. Two Acton area men have been charged with the use of a stolen credit card and fraud. The card was used from September 6, 1982, to January 3, 1983. They were caught at Desmond's Gulf Station on Highway 25 just south of town. One man lives at RR4 Acton and the other at RR 1 Acton, and they used the card 14 times and ran up a bill of \$1,500. A RR4 Acton man reported the theft of a battery from a van parked in his laneway sometime overnight last Tuesday to Wednesday. The battery was valued at \$100.

Handicapped parking bylaw being studied

Halton Hills is following the region in referring a model bylaw drafted by the province for municipalities to use for disabled parking to a region-area municipality staff committee which is looking at a comprehensive parking bylaw. Last week the region's Planning and Public Works and Health and Social Services committees sent a letter from Minister of Transportation and Communications Jim Snow as well as the model bylaw to the special staff committee. Halton Hills general committee took the same action Monday night. The region and Town supported Acton's Lorne Doberthien in his crusade to have licence plates with the disabled symbol for vehicles used by the handicapped developed by the province. His lobbying paid off late last year when Snow announced special disabled plates would be available in 1983 and also unveiled a model bylaw for municipalities to follow to help enforce handicapped parking rights. In response to a question from Councillor Harry Levy, clerk-administrator Ken Richardson informed councillors there should be a staff report on handicapped parking ready in three or four weeks. Levy predicted provisions for handicapped parking may be more complex than now it appears. Councillor Marilyn Serjeantson said Halton Hills citizens have received tickets parking in handicapped parking spots in Brampton because that city only honors its own handicapped stickers or signs. Bylaw enforcement officer Jack Lusty said the licence plates for the disabled will be easily identifiable and those who don't want disabled plates can obtain small signs which are attached to sun visors. He expects Brampton and other municipalities will honor plates and signs from other municipalities because they will be now interchangeable or standardized. Councillor Dave Whiting noted the regional staff was directed to make sure the Halton bylaw honors stickers or plates from other provinces and outside Canada as well. Councillor Ross Knechtel asked if the plates could be obtained by people who drive the handicapped and was told yes.
