SKI SHOP
 In recent months, the ski industry has begun to look at women as a different market, an untapped market.
 Some interesting facts are emerging, particularly among alpine skiers.
 According to the Print Measurement Bureau, a research group in Toronto serving magazine publishers and their advertisers, the number of adult Canadians who favour nordic, or cross-country, skiing is almost equally male and female, with women having a slight edge—51 per cent vs. 49 per cent. They also ski more often, 9 per cent ski more than once weekly, compared to 8 per cent for males.
 But the picture changes radically in downhill skiing.
 PMB estimates that women make up only 38.5 per cent of Canada's 2.5 million alpine skiers, and ski less often than their male counterparts. Only 3 per cent of these female skiers go out once a week or more a season, compared to 5 per cent of male skiers.
 Spot surveys give even lower figures. At Blue Mountain Resorts in Collingwood, Ontario, surveys of 5,000 skiers in line-ups in each of the last two winters found only 35 per cent females, and 86 per cent of those were under 35 years of age.
 Ski Canada Magazine discovered in its survey last year that 68 per cent of its readers are male, 31 per cent female. They also are mainly single (53 per cent), affluent (70 per cent make more than \$25,000), and well-educated (58 per cent had attended university).
 To help more women join the ski world, to participate in the healthy and invigorating outdoor sport, the Canadian Ski Council this year decided to concentrate on this market. This winter, resorts are being surveyed to determine what, if any, women's programs are being offered, and whether resort staff or skiing guests would be interested in a women's ski week in the Spring which would offer fitness classes, discussions on equipment, and tips on skiing from the female point of view.
 CSC seems to be on the right track. This ties in with the Women's Program established by Fitness and Amateur Sport in September, 1980 by the federal government to speed up the participation of women in sports and fitness activities.

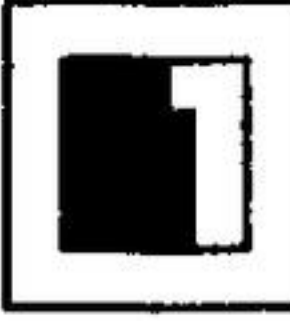
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
