

# Rockmosa repairs started

An estimated \$10,000 to \$12,000 worth of repair work is currently being done to the Rockmosa Community Centre to fix cracks and other deficiencies in the basement.

The consulting professional engineers firm of Gamsby and Mannerow were called in recently to examine the condition of the fairly new hall, and discovered serious cracking in the eight inch thick westerly wall. Cracking, although less serious, was discovered in the east wall, a report also revealed.

Eramosa Township council recently approved the work, which included

injecting polyurethane foam into the block cavities to help support the concrete mortar, and injecting mortar into the cavities on the east and west walls.

The consultants could find no broken blocks in the outside walls, and concluded they are structurally sound. They did however recommend three courses of block on the east and west walls be filled with concrete mortar.

While the interior walls appear to be structurally adequate, they recommended the top three courses be filled with normal cementitious grout similar

to the exterior walls.

Gamsby and Mannerow pointed out in the report that the unsupported floor slabs at the north and south ends, where failure is occurring, should be supported by proper bearing walls or steel beam structures.

G.D. Gamsby said the work would cost approximately \$10-\$12,000, but noted it would be impossible to obtain a firm quotation for this work because of the "exploratory" nature of the work. They hinted that after two working days, the costs could better be determined.
