Special tribute and appreciation was expressed to the following: Mrs. Marion Ostrander and Sunday school teachers for leadership in the Sunday School; the Friendship Guild under the leadership of Mrs. Elizabeth Stevens and the U.C.W. under the leadership of Mrs. Jessie Gellatly; Miss Gladys Hanna for her efficient work as pastoral treasurer; Mr. Gordon Cox as chairman of the Committee of Stewards; Mrs. Margaret Cox and assistants for their work in preparing the annual reports; Mr. George Day for his efforts in acquiring the parking lot and memorial organ.

Over the years we have lost many devoted members, but we rejoice in having many new members become associated with our congregation. The M and M fund has been oversubscribed having raised over \$3,300 for the world wide mission of the United Church.

Worksharing change for Beardmore

A six week extension has been granted for the worksharing program at Beardmore tannery.

In addition to the extension, the format has been changed which sees workers back on the job five days a week, but with less hours per day.

Murray Stewart, spokesperson for Canada Packers, of which Beardmore is a division, explained that as of January 17, instead of employees working full days for only three days a week, they are now working the same hours a week, but in five days.

The number of hours a day and the hours involved vary from department to department, Stewart explained.

Acton's largest firm went on the original worksharing program on September 1, for four days a week. This was later cut back to three days a week, but the program ended in mid-January. At that time, the spokesperson said, the firm asked for and was granted the new format, plus the extension. This latest program will end in early March. Work sharing is a federal government project which sees factories cutting back working hours, but allowing the employees to collect unemployment insurance benefits for the hours cut back.

Mr. Gordon Ostrander and Dr. Ben Wingrove were re-elected to the Session and Mrs. Elizabeth Stevens and Mr. Charlie Anderson were elected as new elders. Mr. Alex McPhedran, for many years a faithful elder of the church was elected as an Honorary Elder. Other elders are: Mrs. Audrey McGillyray, Harvey Bayne, John Buchanan, George Day, Wilbur Patterson, Wynne Dunbar, and Lloyd Dyer.

Gordon Cox and Sandy McPhedran were re-elected to the Committee of Stewards. Neil Darby and Jack Powell were elected as new members to this committee. Other Stewards are Miss Gladys Hanna, Charles Brown, Walter Stevens, Robert Ostrander, Chester Meek, and Bert Smith.

George Day expressed his appreciation of the congregation to Rev. and Mrs. Rees for their untiring leadership and devotion to the congregation during the past year.
