## G. Jocque pleads guilty

Joseph Glen Jocque, RR4 Acton, has been convicted of trafficking in cannibis resin. He will be sentenced March 11.

Jocque pleaded guilty to the charge Friday, in front of criminal county court Judge Thomas J. Quinlan, in Milton.

Federal Prosecutor Bill Manderson told Judge Quinlan that on November 26, 1981, an RCMP undercover officer was in the 747 Restaurant in Acton, and approached Jocque for some "smoke". Jocque pulled one gram of hash from his pocket and told the officer it cost \$10. The officer removed the tin foil and smelled the substance, and gave Jocque the money, Completing the transaction.

The officer turned the goods over to his undercover team, which had it analysed. Defense lawyer Joseph Service noted his client was 23 years of age, and employed by his father as a rural mail carrier. He has no criminal record, the lawyer pointed out.

According to Sinclair, Jocque sold the officer resin from his own personal supply, and only enough for two cigarettes. He charged exactly what he had paid for it, making no money on the deal at all: -

Sinclair told the judge that the officer requested more drugs from Jocque, who could provide no more. Jocque told the officer he was not in the selling business. The arrest, several months later, came in the early morning hours, and at the time Jocque had no drugs in his possession.

At the request of Service, Judge Quinlan ordered a pre-sentence report and a community service assessment. He hinted at community service work as a partial deterrent.


