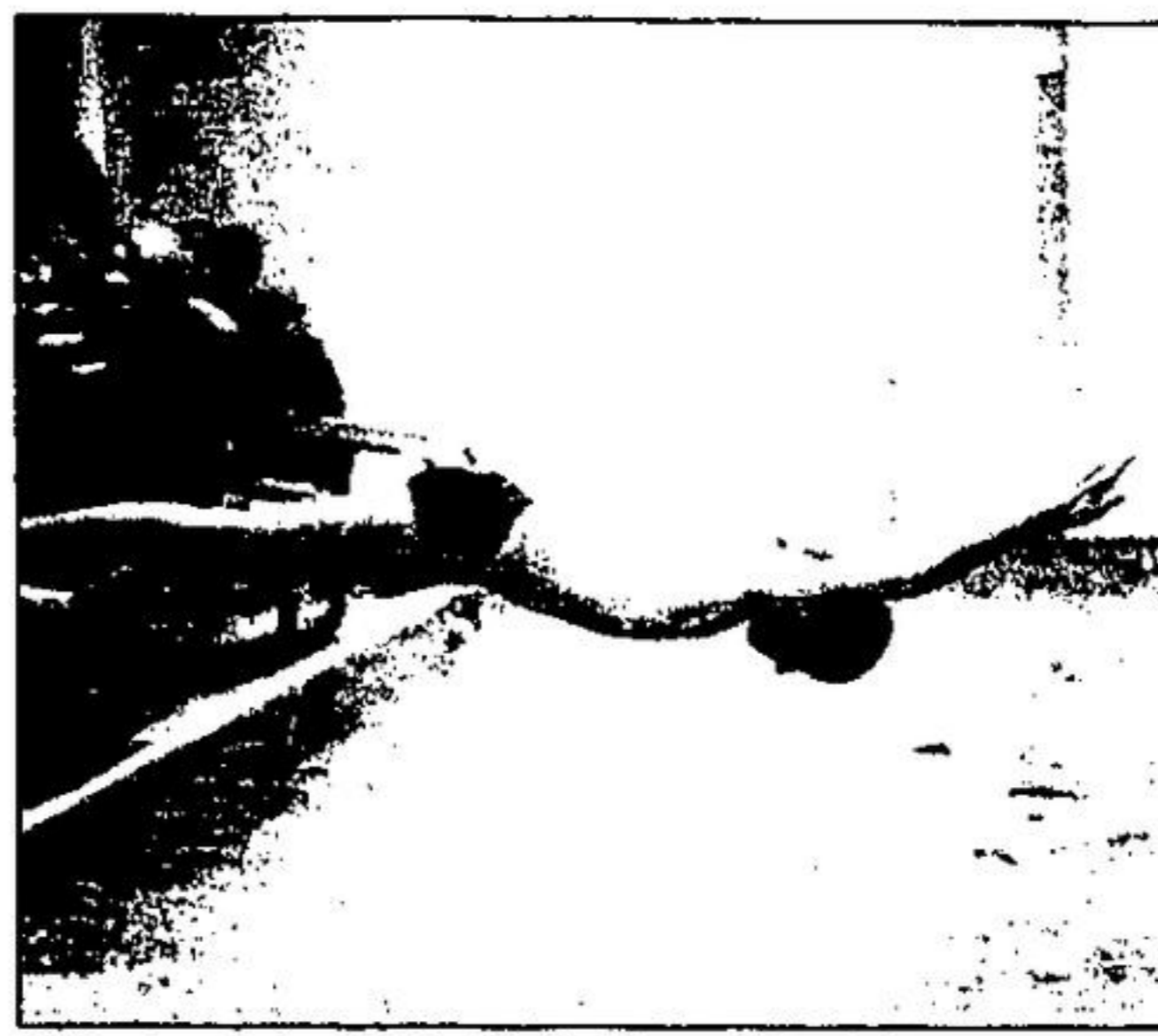

AHS swimmers win sixth meet

Thursday the Acton High swim team hosted M.M. Robinson and E.C. Drury in a meet which saw the Redmen come away with their sixth consecutive victory of the season. Acton finished with 193 overall points. They were followed by M.M.R. with 88 and Drury with 79.

In the senior girls' division, Renata Brillinger placed first in the 100M backstroke, second in the 100M Individual Medley, and was a member of two winning relay teams: the 200M Medley and the 200M freestyle. Laura Brillinger captured first place in the 50M butterfly, and was second in the 100M backstroke. She was also on the 200M Medley and the 200M freestyle relays.

Karen Coats took first in the 100M freestyle and second in the 50M freestyle, as well as swimming on both relays.

Marla Brillinger placed first in the 100M backstroke.

Sharon McBride swam to fourth place in the 50M butterfly and was fifth in the 50M freestyle. She was also a member of the 200M freestyle relay.

Catherine Coffin finished fourth in the 100M backstroke and fifth in the 100M freestyle. Lori Fountain swam to a third place in the 200M freestyle, while Heather Quinn was a member of the 200M Medley Relay.

Uranick seventh at Indoor Games

On Friday evening, Acton's Doreen Uranick ran in the Canadian Ladies' Open 800M race in the Maple Leaf Indoor Games in Toronto. Doreen placed seventh out of eight of the best female runners in Canada.

While her time of 2:17.91 wasn't Doreen's best over 800M, her coach, Bruce Andrews, was satisfied. Andrews explained that the track size was unfamiliar to the Acton High School student, and the crowd of some 12,000 was intimidating.

Race winner Grace Verbeek, of the Hamilton Olympic Club, is 28—more than 10 years older than Doreen. While she was the sole high-school competitor in

the race, Doreen finished only six seconds behind Verbeek.

On Saturday the Road-Huggers competed in an all-comers indoor meet at York University.

Gord March finished second in his 400M heat with a time of 53.9.

George Gidman placed third in his 800M heat, posting a time of 2:00.8. This was George's second best 800M time.

Doreen Uranick ran a personal best, 2:14.7 in the open 800M. In this race Doreen ran against both male and female competitors.

This Sunday George and Doreen will compete in the Ontario junior and senior indoor track and field championships at York.

losses.

February 2 the juniors defeated T.A. Blakelock, 33-27 in Acton. High scorers for the Redmen were Cliff Nibbs and Warren Somers with six points each, and Pete Faber with five.

On Friday the junior Redmen travelled to White Oaks where they won by a score of 61-45. In this contest, Nibbs had 17 points while Dave Leslie sunk 12.

The juniors have improved their record to three wins and six losses and are hoping to reach the playoffs, with Scott Allonby returning to the lineup after an injury.

On Friday the midget boys lost at home to Loyola, 46-29. High scorers for Acton were Chris Stewart with nine points, Jamie Lawson with eight and Joffy Silcock and Jay Corson each netting four.

The midgets record is now one win and six losses.
