No study results until 1984

Halton region's \$35,000 study on the elderly has begun, but any results from it will not be ready until the end of the year. according to Halton Region's Social Services director Debbie Oakley.

Oakley stresses that the study is not a "needs study," but one which will determine what role the region will play as a provider of services to the elderly. The region outlined their plans for the year-long study at a meeting at Centennial Manor in mid-January.

A local man who attended the meeting said he asked one of the consultants if they knew the date the announcement was made about the proposed Georgetown nursing home. "He didn't even know that," he said, adding he did not like the idea of outsiders coming into the region to tell them what to

But Bill Leonard, executive director of the Halton District Health Council believes that happens when outside help is used. "You look at Debbie Oakley's department and wonder why they can't do this, but with the welfare and unemployment, they are working their heads off there with their own jobs." he maintained, adding he thought the study was progressive and reasonable."

And Carol Gooding, Oakville councillor and chairman of the elderly study steering committee claims the study is "a first."

"This is the first time any region has done a study of this kind," said Gooding, adding the length of time for the study is not unusual. "In fact, the length of time for this study is only realistic. When any study is done in such depth, it takes a lot of time." Asked if the region could not determine

their role by reviewing other studies rather than beginning another, Gooding said no. She mentioned the emphasis on Helton Manor is an essential part of the study and is important to the region as eventually they will be spending money on the Manor.

So far, study consultants Peat Marwick/Crichton MacCoy have conducted interviews, sent out a questionnaire and reviewed other studies. At the end of April, public meetings are planned to gather input from area people.

Phase 1, costing \$35,000, should be ready by June, according to Oakley.

"The second phase of the study will

present solutions and offer alternatives" explained Gooding. It will cost about \$20,000 and will not be completed until the end of the

Jane Saunders, an assistant researcher with the Halton District Health Council, said this new study is necessary because the 1981 Health Council study only centred on health, not services.

"The region is a major provider and player in this game," she maintained. "They have to know about the services available so they don't overlap. Our mandate is only health-we didn't touch on services or the Manor."

"The Manor is the major part of the study because it is the only home for the aged in the region," explained director of the study, Rick Kaufman, administrator of the Manor. "We have to find out about services so there is no needless duplication (of services)."

He mentioned recent predictions have indicated that there will be double the amount of senior citizens in Halton within the next 20 years.

Review consolidation schools in Halton Hills

A probe into the possible closure of four North Halton schools has been postnoned by Board of Education Superintendent of Business and Finance Barb Moore.

Enrolment projections for Glen Williams, Limehouse and Speyside Public Schools in Halton Hills and Milton's Percy W. Merry show the schools will all be under minimum enrolment requirements by 1985. In fact, Moore's report to the board Thursday revealed two schools, Speyside and Percy Merry, are already under the minimum.

Board policy 7000-21 states "Schools whose enrolment reaches that indicated below need to be identified and studied because closure is a possibility within three years." Schools with kindergarten (k) to grade 5, minimum enrolment factor is 120. K to 6 is 140, K to 8 is 250, 7 to 8 120, 6 to 8 is 180. Glen Williams (k-5) had 143 pupils as of

September, 1982, with a 1985 projection of 118. Minimum factor is 120. Limehouse (k-6), minimum factor 140, has 158 students now and 130 projected enrolment. Speyside (k-6) is already five pupils under minimum of 140. The 1985 projected figure is 95. Percy Merry (k-6) is six under the

minimum 140, with 111 pupils expected in A school Study Group is set up to investi-

gate a school that may be closed within three years. The group looks into all factors, including enrolment, future population of the school's area, how the school serves the community and what the alternatives would be should the school be closed, etc.

While the four schools would normally warrant a study group at this time. Moore recommended against it. She pointed out most schools in Halton

Hills are facing declining enrolment. Because of this she recommeded the formation of a School Consolidation Study Group. Percy Merry is a unique situation Moore declared. If the school was to be closed, there are no other schools in Milton with the

capacity to take the extra students. There is also a concern for the primary students and the resulting long bus rides, she told the trustees.

Esquesing trustee Dick Howitt asked if the staff had looked into the restructuring of schools so that kindergarten to grade 6 schools can also accomodate grades 7 and 8.

Moore answered that no decision had been made as to which schools would be included in consolidation.
