Few new projects in budget.

Storm sewer work engineering is also proposed for 1983 for Albert and part of McNabb streets, while storm sewers would be installed on other parts of Albert and McNabb, as well as King, Durham and Murdock.

In the rural area gravel would be put on parts of the Eighth, Ninth and Tenth Lines and 27 Sideroad all north of Georgetown, to improve the base and surface and allow for proper grading. Also phase two of the 17 Sideroad and Fourth Line reconstruction project is slated for this year.

Land purchases for road widenings in Halton Hills are also urged by staff.

The total cost of roads and works projects is \$1,738,386 of which \$743,743 would come from local taxes, \$833,643 from provincial subsidies and \$161,000 from reserve funds.

Buy five new trucks The works department also wants to buy five new trucks; a hopper sander; replace a welder generator and a cemetery frost remover; buy a new asphalt roller and a cemetery monument setter (to safely replace toppled headstones). Smaller equipment purchases proposed for this year include lawn mowers; chain saws; hand tools and power scythes. The total cost of vehicle and equipment \$216,000, with all the money

coming from local taxes. Phase two of the Georgetown BIA project planned for 1983 carries a price tag of \$93,200, of which \$53,000 would come from local taxes and the rest from the BIA. If it is decided to develop both the new Church St.

parking lot and sidewalk as well as make sidewalk and street improvements to Mill St. in Acton this year the cost to taxpayers for these \$201,000 projects would be \$105,000. with the Acton BIA picking up the remaining \$100,000.

The recreation department plans 14 purchases and projects for a total cost of \$208,500. Local taxes would pay for \$120,625 of these purchases and projects with \$25,500 coming from reserve funds, \$21,875 from other contributions and \$40,500 from Queen's Park.

In Acton the recreation department wants to continue with Prospect Park renovations, put in creative playground equipment at St. Joseph's School and in a proposed park on Greenore Cres.

Georgetown projects suggested for this year include constructing a soccer field at Alcott; installing creative playground equipment at Howard Wriggleworth and St. Francis of Assisi schools; continuing Norval Community Centre renovations; replacing and repairing the roof at Memorial Arena; roof painting and repairs at Alcott arena; and putting in new plexiglass in one area of Alcott. Two other projects, repairing the filtration system and replacing the deck. would take place at Dick Licata outdoor

pool. The recreation department is also suggesting installing creative playground equipment at various other locations in Halton Hills and renovating soccer fields around the Town.

Street light upgrading is planned in both Georgetown and Acton and would be paid for from the urban service charge an extra tax paid by people living in wards one, three and four, but not ward two. Street lighting improvements in Acton would include some new equipment on Mill St. West as well as completion of a street light replacement program in other parts of town. The cost for Acton street light upgrading in 1983 would be \$12,564.

In Georgetown street light improvements would cost \$28,071.

Conservation Authority projects which Halton Hills must help fund include erosion control measures at Glen Williams cemetery; Armstrong Ave., Georgetown, bank stabilization work; channelization of Silvercreek and bank stabilization works in the Eden Pl. area of Georgetown; flood control in Norval; erosion control around North Halton Golf and Country Club; and various projects like vegetation planting, gabion works and watershed cleaning projects; and acquisition of the Deltacraft property in Georgetown. Halton Hills would have to kick in \$213,165 for these seven projects costing a total of \$522,300.

One project covered in the capital forecast made in 1982 for 1983, but not included in the 1983 preliminary capital budget is the municipal complex or central administration building. Treasurer Ray King noted in his report to the budget committee that he hasn't included the \$1,000,000 debenture planned for 1983 since further direction is needed from council.

He also noted Halton Hills has followed a "pay-as-you-go" policy for capital financing. The "outstanding debenture principal" as of the end of last year was a "relarively low" \$984,940 and debt charges this year will be only \$163,210. Again no debenture financing has been included in the preliminary capital budget. -

For all of the projects contained the preliminary capital budget the cost for local taxpayers would be \$1,504,129. King noted for the past three years capital projects have been limited to \$1,050,000 to \$1,100,000 and urged the same range by maintained this year.

The treasurer noted the department heads were well aware of the need for financial restraint this year and have attempted to "reflect" that attitude in the preliminary

Keep Town spending at 1983 \$7.5 million level

Work on the 1983 Town budget by budget committee and staff is just nicely underway, but already Treasurer Ray King is able to urge that total Halton Hills spending be restricted to the same level as last year, " \$7,568,048 to keep the Town mill rate increase from climbing into double digits.

As part of his report in the preliminary capital budget for 1983 now being reviewed by the committee, King says spending must be restricted to the 1982 level because the revenue picture Isn't very bright.

King predicts only a "minimal" increase in provincial grants, decreases in the amount of interest the Town earns in bank deposits, an assessment increase of just .4 per cent for 1983 and the surplus from 1982 is much smaller than the budget committe had

to work with last year. He noted all aspects of the 1983 operating budget have not been assembled yet but they did have enought information now to urge 1983 spending, both current and capital, be "restricted to the 1982 level."


