On Saturday the North-Halton Road Huggers competed in the oldest indoor track and field meet in Canada—the Highlander's Indoor Games in Hamilton.

In the boys' 18-and-under 880 yard run, George Gidman won his heat with a time of 2:03.7. George then went on to the 880 final Saturday night which he also won, running a 2:03.5.
