M. Carnochan

Friends and family were saddened to hear of the death of Margaret Carnochan on January 20, in St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph, following a lengthy illness.

Mr. Carnochan, of 32 Hadali Road, Guelph, was a former Acton area resident, and had a great zest for life.

Born in Nassagaweya Township on October 23, 1902, she was the daughter of Arthur Stewart and Margaret Storey. She attended SS No. 7 Nassagaweya school, and still kept in touch with some of her most valued friends.

Mrs. Carnochan was a great reader, particularly admiring the work of columnist Bill Smiley and former Free Press Writer Wendy Thomson. She was very interested in the Civil War history, and kept up with the news in Acton until her death. As avid a reader as she was, she enjoyed writing short stories, mainly about events that happened when she was young. She also liked to write poetry, and liked to paint also.

Mrs. Carnochan lived the first 38 years of her life at RRI Acton, and moved back for another five years later on. She loved her senior citizens' apartment, where she made many new friends in her five years there.

She was predeceased by her husband Robert Carnochan, her parents and three sisters, Annie Frank and Ethel MacLeod, RRI Acton, and Mary Simpson, Rosetown, Saskatchewan. Left to mourn her loss are: daughter Dolores Doughty, Guelph; two granddaughters, Susan and Sandra, Guelph; brothers Arthur Stewart, Dawson Creek, B.C., and Fred Stewart of Montreal; and close friends Viola Sprowl, Acton, Velma Kennedy, Milton, Mary Britton, Alma Bullock and Pearl Anderson, all of Guelph, formerly of Nassagaweya.

Mrs. Carnochan was affiliated with the Jehovah's Witnesses.

Guest speaker for Lenten lunches

Mr. Hunt returned to Toronto and was an Elder at Toronto Catechism Ministry at St. Paul's Bloor St., from 1970-73. In late 1973, he became Associate Director of Bezek Centre, a Renewal and Retreat Centre. Mr. Hunt is now Pastor of the Gilgal Covenant Community at Bezek.

Mills gets 6 months

Samuel Herbert Mills, of Poplar Ave., has been sentenced to six months in jail after being convicted of trafficking in a narcotic, cannabis resin.
