**78 at Day of Prayer**

World Day of Prayer was observed in Acton with an ecumenical service in St. Alban's Anglican Church Friday.

Some 78 women were in attendance and 12 members of the different churches took active part in the service. The theme of this year's service was New Persons in Christ.

Mrs. Penny Bristow of St. Alban's welcomed the ladies to the church, and opened the service with a call to prayer and a message from the women of the Caribbean. Mrs. June Tribe of St. Alban's gave the call to worship and announced the hymn to be sung—Praise to the Lord, The Almighty. Passages of Scripture were read by ladies from St. Joseph's Parish, Acton Baptist Church, Pentecostal Church and from Churchill Community Church.

Mrs. Tribe led in thanking God for His Son Jesus, to which the congregation replied with appropriate sentences of thanks. Sally Smith of Trinity United read a portion of Luke 15, to show how Jesus forgives us when we confess our sins to him. Mrs. Tribe as Leader listed the sins for which we asked forgiveness.

The next section of the service dealt with giving thanks and praise by women of Faith, and was illustrated by nine ladies each reading a verse outlining the reasons for their belief in God and His Son, Jesus. June Tribe led in an expression of thanks for the blessings we receive, and in asking in Jesus' Name, His blessings and mercy on all less fortunate than ourselves. The congregation then joined in The Lord's Prayer.

Mrs. Tribe introduced the guest speaker for the afternoon—Captain Mrs. Winnie Perrin of the Salvation Army. One of a family of twelve who grew up in Newfoundland, Captain Mrs. Perrin met her husband while they were both attending college. They were married in 1975, and began their ministry in Newfoundland, from where they were stationed in Wingham and then Acton.

Keeping to the theme of New Persons in Christ, Captain Mrs. Perrin stressed how each new day could be a new beginning in our lives, how a fresh start could be made learning from the mistakes made in previous days. We receive the blessings of God fresh each day, as fresh as the dew. The speaker referred to the potter in Jeremiah, who dissatisfied with the vessel he was molding broke the clay down into a mass again to make a fresh start. In the same way today, if we put our lives in God's hands, He can remodel us into better people.

Quoting poems learned as a child and during her training in the army, Captain Mrs. Perrin stressed the great qualities of compassion, humility, gentleness and forgiveness we develop in closeness with God. The speaker recalled the closing line of a favourite army hymn—"Oh What a Change—What a Difference, To have an encounter with God." We were reminded that in His presence is fullness of joy at His right hand, and of Jesus' statement that He came in order that we might have life and have it more abundantly—heavenly life.

Captain Mrs. Perrin reminded the congregation of the great healing power of Jesus, and emphasized to know Jesus is to love Him. We were reminded of Christ's promise to his disciples to follow Him, and He would make them healers of men.

In closing, the speaker affirmed her belief that when we have done the best we can, we know we have God's approval, and prayed that He would help us each and every day.

Finally, Captain Mrs. Perrin read a poem entitled "My Influence," the first line of which was—My life shall touch a dozen lives before the day is done—and the final line becomes a prayer—Lord, may my life help other lives it touches by the way.

Mrs. June Tribe led the congregation in an expression of thanks, and a hymn entitled—A Song of Renewal—was sung while the offering was received. Mrs. Marie Hargrave and Mrs. Madeleine Lee acted as ushers during the service, and took the offering to the altar to be received by Rev. Arthur Tribe.

Rev. Tribe closed the service with the benediction, following which the guests were invited into the Parish Hall for refreshments.

During the service, A.C.W. members Lorna Clark and Babs Mitchell tended the nursery in the lower Parish Hall.

**PUBLIC NOTICE ROAD PROJECTS**  
(Section 301 of The Municipal Act)

Take notice that the Council of The Regional Municipality of Halton intends to pass, at its meeting to be held Wednesday, March 23, 1983, a number of By-laws regarding the road projects set out below:

- (1) PR-505 Replacement of four culverts crossing Guelph Line — three of the culverts are located between Colling road and Britannia Road — one culvert is located immediately south of No. 8 Sideroad on Guelph Line.
- (2) PR-113 Widening of the Guelph Line and the relocation of the ditch on the east side of Guelph Line, a distance of approximately 1,800 feet (548 m), from Colling Road.
- (3) PR-506 Widening and reconstruction of Tralalgar road from Maple Avenue (Regional Rd. No. 11) to Highway No. 7.
- (4) PR-377B Widening and reconstruction of Derry Road from a limit of construction 456 m (1,500 ft.) east of Appleby Line to a limit of construction 370 m (1,200 ft.) west of Walkers Line. The project will also include the reconstruction of Walkers Line 55 m (180 ft.) north of Derry Road and 200 m (656 ft.) south of Derry Road and Appleby Line, a distance of 100 m (328 ft.) north and south of Derry Road.

Through its Planning and Public Works Committee, at a meeting to be held Wednesday, March 16, 1983, 9:00 a.m., the Council will hear any person who claims that his land will be prejudicially affected by these by-laws and who applies to be heard.
