Aggiss training for '84 Olympics

A first year honors Geography student at Wilfrid Laurier University, Limehouse's Sara Aggiss, is in training for the 1984 Olympics, to be held in Los Angeles.

Sara, a graduate of Georgetown High School, is one of Canada's promising athletes in the gymnastics category. This includes the uneven bars, the beam and the vault as well as the floor competition.

She has been working hard to perfect her talents for some years. Beginning to take an interest in gymnastics with her sisters, when she was only ten, Sara has been training 4½ hours a day for the last few years.

"My parents were the ones that first introduced the sport to me," she said. Her two coaches, Don and Benita Rope, have helped her to improve her abilities at the Cambridge Gymnastics Club, just twenty minutes by car from Laurier.

Aggiss has competed at the international level already. She attended the Moscow

World Gymnastics Championships in November, 1981.

She has also attended many world invitationals. Sara came in third in the U.S. for her performance on the floor last June. She was also on the Canadian team when they won a gold medal in England two years ago.

Sara prizes the medal which she won in Texas the most. "I worked very hard for it," she said.

Sara sees the U.S. and the Soviet teams as the toughest for the Canadian team to overcome, but she thinks the East German and Japanese teams are within reach.

Sara hopes that she will make the Canadian Olympic team in 1984. Her plans beyond this are undecided, however. She believes her second major in Physical Education at Laurier will enhance her chances in pursuing a career in athletics.

Aggiss enjoys what she does and has the full support of her university.

"We are very fortunate to have her at our school," Fred Nichols, dean of students at Wilfrid Laurier University, said.

Raiders trail Shipbuilders

It has been a long time since Georgetown Chrysler Raiders have lost two games in a row and it couldn't have come at a worse time for the defending Canadian champions.

The Raiders have been taking it easy over the past couple of weeks, toying with the Barrie Flyers, and that may have taken a toll in their fight for the OHA Major Intermediate 'A' title.

The Raiders fell 4-3 at home on Friday night and then gave up four third period tallies in Collingwood on Sunday to lose 7-3 as the Shipbuilders took command of their best-of-seven final series with a two game lead.

Raider coach Gary Ford was concerned that his team may not be able to turn it on and off and his intuition seems to have turned into reality as the red and white have not been playing up to expectations.

On Friday at Gordon Alcott the Raiders fell behind 1-0 on a lone first period goal and that proved to be the difference. The teams exchanged second period tallies and each added a couple in the final frame. When the final buzzer sounded the visiting Shipbuilders had done what very few teams have been able to do—defeat the Raiders on their own ice.

The turning point in the match came with less than a minute remaining in the middle stanza. Trailing by one the Shipbuilders found the equalizer and never looked back.

Four goals in the opening seven minutes of the final frame put the Raiders in a deep hole at will take hard work and determination to dig out.
