## Jocque gets one month

The last four Acton men charged with trafficking in a narcotic in February, 1982, were sentenced to one month in jail by County Court Judge Thomas Quinlan Friday in Milton.

Glen Jocque, RR 4, Acton pleaded guilty to one count last month, after he sold one gram of hash worth \$10 to an undercover RCMP officer in late 1981. Judge Quinlan said he is not opposed to the temporary absence program for Jocque, but will not recommend it to correctional institute staff.

Citing a number of cases where convicted traffickers were not given jail sentences, defence lawyer Joe Servoce noted Jocque was an intelligent, 23-year-old who has always been employed. At the present time he is working for his father, who is a mail contractor.

A jail term for his client could cause severe hardships for the accused, as well as his family, whom Jocque helps because of his father's health. Servoce noted his client had sold the officer only enough for two cigarettes, out of his own personal supply. The officer approached him in a washroom in a restaurant in Acton, so the sale was not Jocque's idea.

At the time of arrest, the lawyer argued,
