The players were great athletes moving with a precision that was not often seen at that time.

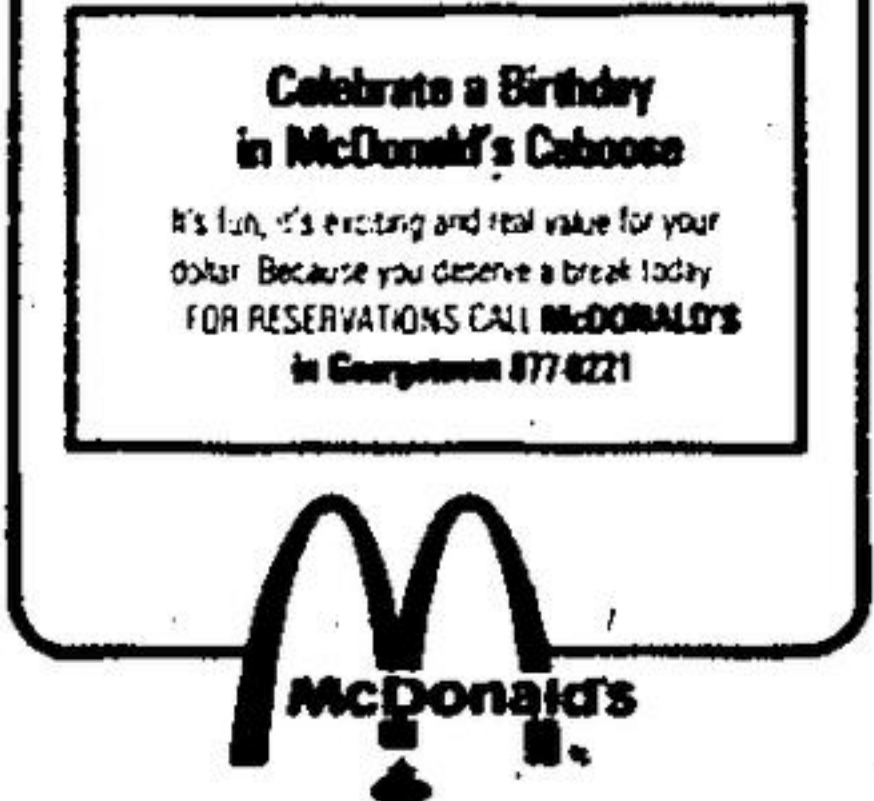
