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Acton soccer team to play in Mississauga

While the name of the team is new, the members of the Leathertown Men's Soccer Team have been around the Acton soccer scene for a number of years.

The nucleus of the new soccer club, which will be based in Acton but play all of its regular season games in Mississauga, is a closely-knit group of players that have been together for the past five or six seasons, according to head coach Brian Saxon.

Last year the squad played as a "B" team in the Acton Villa organization, but have decided to form their own club for the sake of unity. If the new Leathertown team had stayed in the Villa organization, they may

have been forced to split up, and it is for this reason, according to Saxon, that the players requested a new format.

The team will play in the Lakeshore Industrial Recreation League. The league is divided into three divisions of eight teams each, with clubs coming from Mississauga, Georgetown, Oakville, Toronto, and Etobicoke, as well as Acton.

The Leathertown players wanted exposure to quality soccer with an emphasis on the social side of the game. Saxon reasons that both these goals will be realized with their entry into the new league. Many players of very high standards come from Toronto and area to play in the weekend league, now into its 25th season of competition.

There will be a direct affiliation between the Leathertown team and the Acton Youth Soccer Club. Saxon wants to eventually bring players from the junior Acton squads up to play for the new organization.

"Ninety-per cent of our team are products of the Acton minor soccer program with nowhere else to play," explains the coach. Members of the team will be assisting with the Youth Soccer Club by coaching and/or refereeing, as needed.

The club is now training indoors every Sunday afternoon at the McKenzie-Smith gymnasium in preparation for a number of exhibition games and tournaments. They will be outside "as soon as the recreation department allows us on the field," but until then, Saxon is satisfied with gym and road workouts. He is impressed with the initial response the team has received, feeling that it serves a definite need of the community; providing an alternate club for the young players to recognize and work toward.

To kick off the season, the Leathertown Men will compete in a 22-team tournament starting the first weekend in May. The team is also planning a series of exhibition matches in May in Montreal.

Tom O'Carroll is the club president. Anne Entwistle as secretary and Ron Gourlay, treasurer, also sit on the initial Leathertown team executive.
