Rick Fellows' rink wins McKenzie-Smith's first curling crown

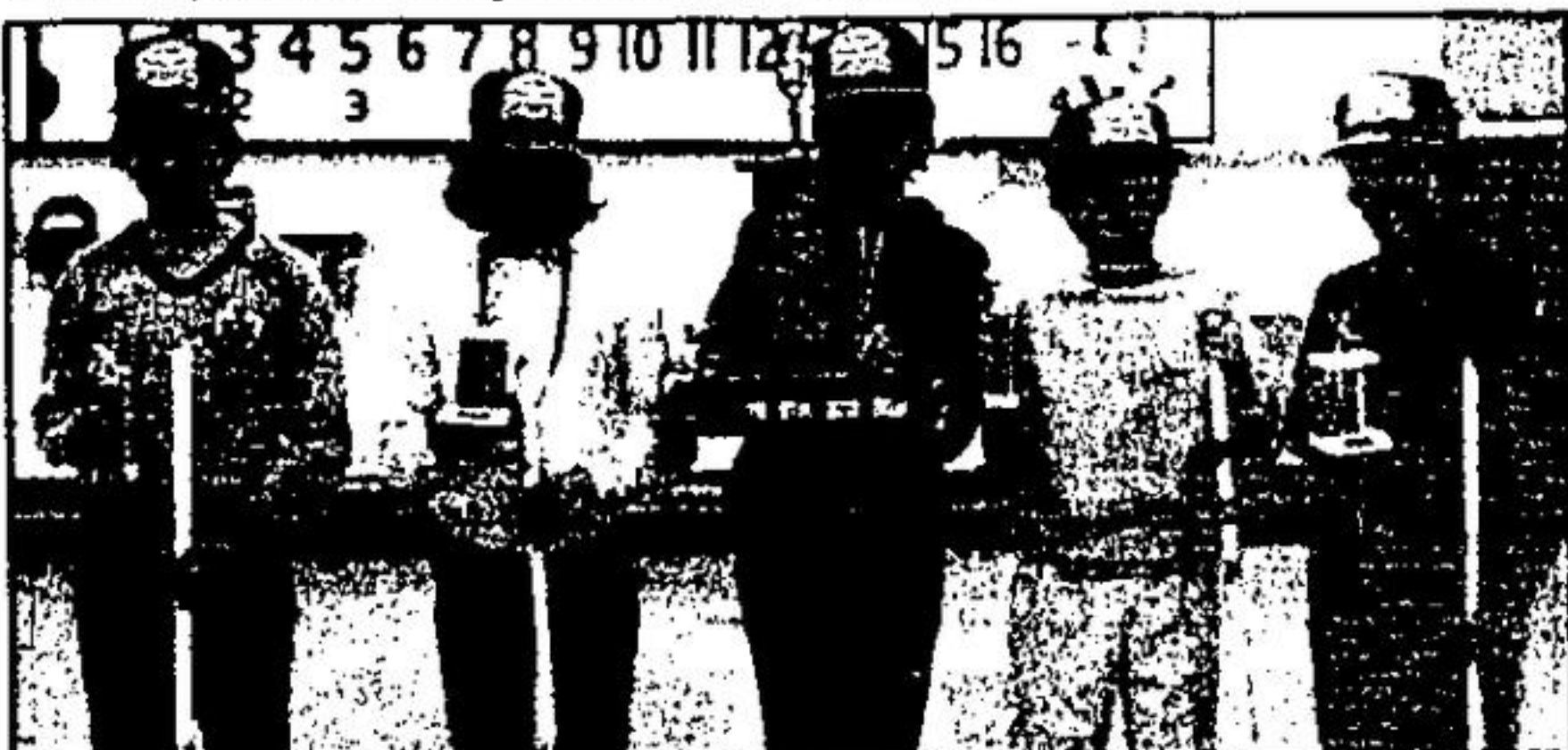
