
representing Ontario in the Canadian Championships to be held in London next

Acton's Industrial ball league kicks off its regular season tonight (Wednesday) with a game between the Good News Bears and the Acton Royals.

If the wintry weather persists, one can imagine a post-game scene; frozen ballplayers huddling at a nearby picnic table, sipping hot chocolate long into the night.

When league president Ron McKnight says he's looking forward to the season, his thoughts are likely more centred on those lazy Sundays in July, than these blustery nights in April.

But enough about the weather, baseball's back in town.

This is McKnight's first year as league president. He is joined on the executive by Ron Hachey, first vice president; George Wallace, treasurer; and Rick Baginski, secretary.

There will be eight teams in the industrial loop this season-down from ten last year. The biggest problem is a lack of pitchers, according to Hachey. However, no one seems to be very worried.

Fread Construction, last year's playoff champions, will be back. So will the Roadrunners, Halton Hills Furniture, The Bears. Desmond's, and Canadian Tire. The Royals (last year the Industrials) and the Acton A's (formerly Halton Hills Electric) will be new additions. The defending league champion

Metros and Station Hotel have withdrawn. President McKnight offers an insight into the success of the league through the years; "Everyone seems to have fun whether they win or lose." He is also aware that the league "was originally formed for the fun and recreation of the players. Competitiveness is all anybody can really ask for."

Regular season games are played Wednesday and Thursday evenings at 8.30 p.m. and Sundays at 10 a.m., 12 noon, 2 p.m., and 4 p.m. All games are scheduled to be played on the Prospect Park diamond.

The season is starting three days early this year, in order to be finished playoffs before the fall fair in September.

McKnight hopes to initiate an Acton-Georgetown Industrial league exhibition game this season. The game, which is still in the planning stage, would pit the first place team from Acton against its cross-town counterpart, with all proceeds going to charity.
