Watching search and rescue planes plus a police boat heading out into Georgian Bay Sunday morning has given me more respect for the vicious cross chop waves that south Georgian Bay pro-

Life jackets are great to have and wear but in these cold water temperatures the only hope one would have is another boat nearby for rescue as a person would probably last no more than 10 minutes at most in the water.

While fishing from a very adequate boat on the land tip we had the opportunity to watch many small boats braving good sized waves. Many were heading out into the lake in 12 foot car toppers with three adult anglers aboard, plus a host of gear and equipment.

Only one other boat with any great capacity was observed out of the at least 35 boats we saw.

I am not one who likes more rules and regulations or encroachment on our movements or present freedoms. However, some enforcement will have to come regarding boat capacities as opposed to water temperatures, plus wind velocity. Summer time boat accidents just don't hold a candle to upsetting in cold April water.

Fishing was relatively slow recently with most anglers reporting one or two fish per boat. Rainbow are the predominate catch with Splake very low in numbers.

It looks like commercial fish boats have done their jobs very well in the past season on this species. Hopefully a few Pickerel will survive the nets for propagation this spring. When will our government ever smarten up as to the wishes of the people of Ontario.

On the April 2 weekend a party from Milton area had about as good a day as one could have. While fishing at Georgian Bay they boated 23 fish, keeping just a few for their own use. Many of these fish were in the six pound category as the photo below shows. That's Jim Smith on the right with Jim Sales centre and Mike Merritt on the left, good fishermen and sportmen all.

Cost of sports

Swimming costs top \$70,000

Operation and maintenance of the Acton indoor pool and the wading pool and Fairy Lake swimming area at Prospect Park is expected to cost Halton Hills \$71,705 in 1983. Because the indoor pool is shared by the Halton Board of Education that body pays a good chunk of the cost. Halton Hills' share is \$34,000.

At the same time the Town expects the indoor pool and wading pool to bring in \$35,600 in 1983, \$32,800 from the indoor pool.

Wages and benefits for staff for both the indoor and wading pools and lake is pegged at \$56,385 for this year, \$46,725 for indoor pool personnel.

cleaning. Equipment, maintenance and chemical supplies; office supplies; books for special programs; swimming awards; and hydro; is

expected to cost \$3,425 in 1983. Repair and maintenance of building and equipment, adverphotocopying; insurspecial programs; ance: telephone; mileage and meals for staff, memberships and

subcriptions for staff; conventions and seminars for staff of the three swimming areas is budgetted to cost \$6,015.

Purchases for the indoor pool this year include a diving board hand rail, \$100; lane marker, \$1,200; bulletin board, \$100; fan, \$80; and deak chair, \$100.

The Town plans to buy two paddle boats which will be rented at Fairy Lake and the estimated cost is \$2,520. A wooden deck at the lake is expected to cost \$800.

General admissions to the indoor pool are expected to bring in \$10,000 while revenue from swimming registrations is pegged at \$15,000 for 1983. Pool memberships are expected to bring in another \$1,500.

The Town anticipates raising \$1,050 from pool and locker rentals and special program registrations Halton Hills hopes will produce \$5,000 in revenue. Sale of special program books is expected to bring in \$250.

Registrations and equipment rentals at Fairy Lake and the wading pool are budgetted to produce \$2,800 in revenue.

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Rec. programs cost \$87,335

Hills children's Halton summer programs, recreation programs held throughout the year by the recreation department, and special recreation department events in 1983 will cost Halton Hills \$87,335.

The summer programs have been budgetted to cost \$51,194, while special events carry a price tag of \$3,358.

In addition year round recreaton programs are expected to cost \$32,783.

Wages and benefits for all staff working on the various and recreation programs are budgetted to cost \$55,268. An additional \$5,701 will go for materials. Advertising, mileage and meals for staff. educational courses, rental of buildings, contractural services, etc. will cost \$28,366.

At the same time the Town expects to collect \$60,316 in revenue from registrations and other fees for its programs.





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
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
