Police beat

Canadian Tire hit twice in one night

The Canadian Tire store on Mill St. was hit twice in one night by vandals over the weekend.

Halton Regional Police investigated the theft of approximately \$30 to \$40 in coins from a pop machine in front of the building, sometime overnight Saturday-Sunday. Someone had pried open the coin box.

That same night the plate glass window was smashed, causing \$600 in damages.

Police are also investigating a case of vandalism which took place on either Kingham Rd. or Popular Ave. Police say someone poured sugar in a gas tank of a van parked on those streets sometime between Saturday and Monday.

About \$25 damages resulted after someone used a car to knock over a mail box at Lot 25, Con. 7, at around 2 a.m., Saturday morning.

An energetic thief climbed atop the Pioneer Gas Bar sometime overnight Sunday-Monday and stole three Canadian flags which were on the roof. The flags were valued at \$29.

Police laid eight liquor related charges over the weekend, six involving males from 17-years to 24, and two involving females, ages 29 and 42.

A \$300 portable stereo was taken from a car parked at the Acton High School Friday evening from 9.15 to 10.15.

Someone put his or her fist through a pane of glass in a door at H and H Video, Mill St. sometime between 1 and 2.20 a.m. Friday evening. There was a large amount of blood on the

sidewalk. Damage is estimated at \$30 to the door.

A 19-year-old employee of Frank Heller and Co. was found to be responsible for the theft of two packages of cigarettes from a locker at the Heller building. The cigarettes disappeared sometime during the evening shift Thursday evening.

There were no injuries or charges laid in a domestic dispute on Willow St. South Thursday at 9 p.m. Police say the dispute was between a father and son.

A 22-year-old Acton man has been charged with possession of a narcotic after being questioned by police about a committal warrant. The incident occurred Thursday, at 6.05 p.m.
