(Continued from page 1) pected to take," he said. "We have an excellent handle on this problem, but we may have to get into a political fight to solve it," he added. "There are lots of examples where we have not performed properly, but this is not one of them."

From 1973 to 1983 the MOE and we were on a path that was going to lead to a solution, but now the CVCA gets involved and says they're sorry, but it's a whole new ballgame and to solve the problem out of the Fairy Lake system just isn't good enough any more," he added.

Action residents will receive notices in utility bills and through newspaper advertisements this month and in June advising them of the possible restrictions to be imposed if the water level in the town's reservoir gets too low.

In a report to committee members, Moore said one-third of the total supply in the reservoir has to be kept back for fire fighting. Car washing, lawn watering and air conditioning are the greatest drains on the town's water supply, he added, so their use could be restricted.
