They will be handling a variety of different programs from roller skating lessons, and swim lessons to day camps and nature camps.

Roller Skating lessons are one of the first projects on the Parks and Recreation agenda this summer with Tina McGrath heading up a six week course that is a basic introduction to roller skating-balance, rhythm and style. The course begins Wednesday, May 18 at the Georgetown Memorial Arena and the following night, Thursday, May 19 at the Acton Community Centre. Tennis is another area in which the recreation department is active but only in Georgetown. Tennis players in Acton can attend the Acton club's functions or join the other half of the Town at the Joseph Gibbons or Emmerson courts for

Ladies' morning tennis is a good way to start the day. The Town is offering the use of Joseph Gibbons or Emmerson for \$5 per person per hour beginning this week for ladies' morning fun, and exercise.

Lessons will also be provided in Georgetown by Ed Serjennston for those wishing to improve their game. Those interested in lessons on the Acton courts can call Joan Morris at 853-2854.

Chess is another recreational activity that the Town is trying to promote this summer and anyone in Halton Hills interested in participating in a local club call Joy Gwillam at the Department, \$77-5185, ext. 62.

While the summer is upon us, hockey is still in the recreational minds and the Town of Halton Hills is planning both level One and Level Two coaches clinics.

The Level One Summer Technical Hockey Coaching Course is scheduled for Georgetown District High School and Gordon Alcott Arena Tuesday, August 16 from 6.30 p.m. to 10.30 p.m. Fee for the clinic is \$14 and coaches will need skates, sticks, gloves, beimets and a clip board.

begins at 9 s.m. and ends around 6 p.m. The cost of this course is \$34.

This year's summer programs for youngsters include Tot Lot, day camp, nature camp, and summer activity centres, and sports camp.

The acitivity centres will be placed at St. Joseph's Separate School and McKenzie-Smith Middle School in Acton while George Kennedy Public School will be the home for Georgetown centre. Additional centres include Norval Community Centre, Hornby Community Centre, Glen Williams Public School and Limehouse Public School.

Fees for the centres vary but an average intown centre will cost \$25 per week with cut rates for families. More details can be found in the summer recreation brochure.

Day camps can be found this summer at Prospect Park in Acton and Cedarvale Park, Georgetown. The camp will teach such skills as archery, orienteering, and camp crafts. Sleepovers are scheduled for the second Thursday of each session with outdoor cooking, and singsongs. The

camp runs daily from 9 a.m. till 4 p.m. and costs \$50 per session. Sessions are approximately two weeks in length. The nature camp is offered at Rockwood Conservation Area only and runs three days in August. This special trip is designed for campers between the ages of 10 and 12. It is a two night, three day

The sports camp is once again offered at Georgetown and Acton High Schools with basic instruction in a variety of sports, organized games and swimming.

Susan Ackroyd is once again in charge of the summer activities program as coordinator. Susan will be responsible for a staff of 35, which have already been hired. She is a Child Studies Major at the University of Guelph and is in her sixth year with the Halton Hills summer program.

The pools will also be busy this summer with swim lessons, and other activities. Lessons are offered in a wide range with Parents and Tots being a newly added course. In addition Recreation Department offers handicapped swimming lessons at the Georgetown Indoor Pool on Mondays and Wednesdays from 3.45 to 4.30 p.m. Masters swimming is also offered at the Georgetown Pool for adults over 20 while the Swimming Stars of Acton offer recreational, yet competitive swimming for Acton youngsters.

All-in-all it promises to be an active summer for youngsters and adults alike. The Town is offering several ways to get in shape and have fun and there are several other local ball, soccer, and tennis groups that will be willing to help
