Dunn and Uranick claim Peel-Halton gold

Six athletes from Acton High will be travelling to the regional track and field championships tomorrow (Thursday) in Etobicoke by way of a successful Peel-Halton qualifier last week at Centennial Stadium.

Doreen Uranick picked up two first place finishes on Thursday, winning the Junior Girls 800 and 1500 metre races. In the 800 metre event, Doreen ran a 2:18.00, and in the 1500 metre, she ran a 4:34.1, breaking the Peel-Halton record by approximately nine seconds.

Teresa Dunn also took first spot in a pair of events. Teresa threw 9.88 metres in the Junior Girls Shot Put and 32.88 metres in the Junior Girls Discus, to take the events and continue a successful season.

George Gidman qualified in the Senior Boys 400 metres with a 50.9 clocking, to finish third. He finished in second place in the 800 metre event, with a 2:00.6 time.

Gord March qualified with a fourth place in the Junior Boys 400. His time was 51.8. The Junior Girls relay team ended up second in the Open four by 400 run, with a 4:25.00 time. Doreen Uranick, Pam Mahal, Janice Jickling, and Teresa Dunn ran on the team.
