### Tips from the

## Golf Doctor

of Halton Hills

**POSTURE**  
You have placed the club head at the target, then place your hands correctly on the golf club and taken your stance. Now you're going to turn your attention to the fourth and final stage of address, Posture.

The correct address position has the "butt" moving back, not down. The shoulders tilting slightly forward, not back away from the ball, the arms hanging down from the shoulders and the weight such, that you can lightly lift the heels off the ground—not the toes.

The reason behind setting the address position as described is to help the arms swing the golf club. The body operates in action—reaction. Therefore what you're looking for is the arms swing—ing the body into position, so that the body can swing the arms through the ball. Remember the reaction is just that—a reaction, nothing you should have to force.

But forcing the club throughout the swing is what you probably have always done. Having the four preparation stages enables you to have a chance to swing the golf club according to your size, height, strength etc. In other words you now begin to understand your golf swing—not mine—but yours.

Next week I'm going to look at the number two cause of hitting a bad golf shot—tension.

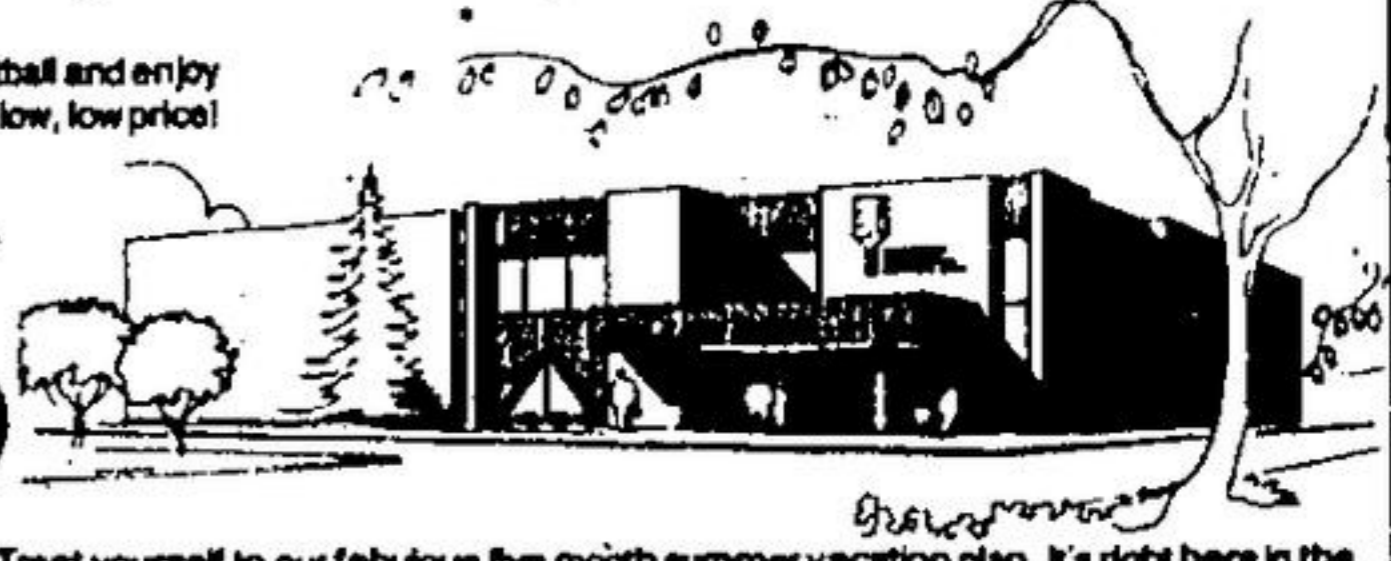

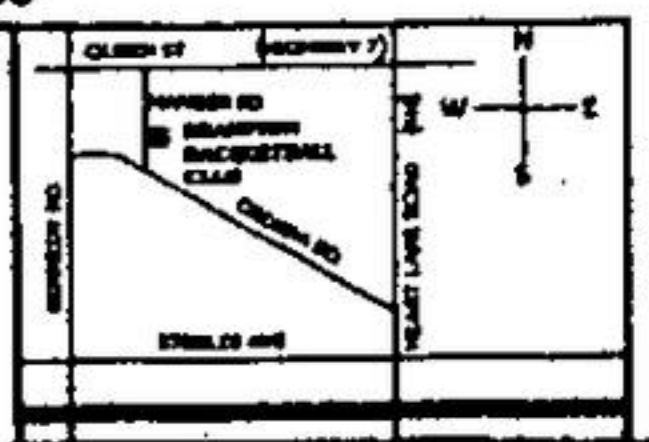
