

Crawford Lake

Heritage Festival Sunday, May 29

The Crawford Lake Heritage Festival on May 29, rain or shine, marks the first anniversary of the Halton Region Conservation Foundation's fund raising campaign with a day of entertainment, education and outdoor fun for the whole family. The festival will feature live entertainers, artists, scientific displays and, of course, a pleasant walk on the Crawford Lake boardwalk.

The entertainers scheduled to perform from about 11 a.m. to late afternoon include: The Jim Skye Native Dancers, a dance theatre troupe based in Brantford; David Campbell, a native singer and song-

writer; and Dick Koechzel and Walt Maynard, who sing country and bluegrass music.

The stage show will be followed by a tree-planting ceremony, featuring wildlife artist Bob Bateman and his wife Birgit, and students from Halton schools who sold seedling trees to raise funds for the Indian Village. Bateman will also choose the winning tickets, in a draw for a nature hike guided by the Batemans, a framed original edition limited print, or an original acrylic painting of the lake by Leigh Cockburn.

The Heritage Festival will also include a number of well-known In-

dian artisans, who will demonstrate their skills during the day.

Jim Skye will be in full Indian regalia, and will display a birch bark canoe and other artifacts, while he discusses traditional culture and Indian language.

Refreshments will be available during the day, with proceeds going toward the fund-raising campaign. Admission for the day is \$3 for adults, with children under 12 free. Shuttle buses will run from Lowville Park, Mohawk Raceway parking lot and Milton Mall, so visitors will be able to avoid congestion at the Guelph Line entrance to Crawford Lake.

Board of Education Briefs

The Halton Board of Education met Thursday evening and approved the following items:

The first step in a five year plan to equip all schools in Halton with computers is to commence. The plan will see 11 secondary schools not already equipped receive not more than 30 micro-computers, with additional printers purchased for each of the six existing labs.

The first phase of the elementary computer program is also to start.

In the first year of the programs, grade 4 to 13 will be taught computers. By the end of the fifth year, kindergarten to grade 13 will be involved.

Trustee Noel Cooper has been appointed to the Computer Advisory Committee.

The go-ahead was received to update the clerical staff allotment for elementary schools. The new policy will see a secretary in each school for at least six hours a day, to ensure the office is covered for emergencies and student needs while children are in the schools.

The twinning of Glen Williams and George Kennedy Schools was approved by trustees. The combined enrolment will be 603 students from kindergarten to grade 5, with the reduction of one principal position.

These schools join Speyside and Robert Little Schools and Limehouse and Joseph Gibbons as twinned Halton Hills' schools.

Comfort at Region, severance granted

Regional chairman Jack Rafals broke an 11-11 tie vote granting a land severance to Speyside resident Eldon Comfort at a meeting Wednesday.

Last week, the planning and public works committee had voted to withdraw the regional appeal of the Land Division Committee (LDC). The request is to sever five acres from a 30 acre property located south of 17 Sideroad, west of Highway 25.

Comfort provoked laughter in the chambers when he told councillors he was overawed by the chambers. "Overawed, but not intimidated," he said.

When asked if he were aware of the planning and public works decision to withdraw the appeal, Comfort responded, "I do not know that, but I also know you people can do whatever you want with that."

He then listed his reasons for the severance, among them being the land was swampy and rocky and therefore unsuitable for farming; the property is on a dead-end street and he has improved the area.

Despite these reasons, most Burlington

and Oakville councillors opted to vote against the withdrawal of the appeal, because they believed it would be "unfair" to others in the region.

"We have to treat people fairly," claimed Joan Little from Burlington who has consistently opposed land severances because they appear to contradict the Official Plan.

But councillors in the north disagreed. "It makes a lot of sense," said Councillor Russ Miller, supporting Mayor Pomeroy's statements that the Official Plan is not inflexible.

"It's not farm land and the area is built-up quite extensively," Miller said.

"No guts,"

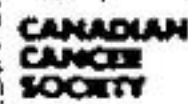

LANDFILL COMPONENT OF SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT

YOU ARE INVITED TO A PUBLIC MEETING TO DISCUSS HALTON'S DISPOSAL SYSTEM FOR THE FUTURE

The consultants preparing the Regional Municipality of Halton's Landfill Component Environmental Assessment have presented the First Stage of their study Waste Needs and Systems Analysis to the Solid Waste Management Committee. The Committee received the report in draft form in April. The consultants have analyzed public comments on the Stage 1 Report and have submitted an Addendum along with a Final Work Program for the Overall Environmental Assessment.

The Solid Waste Management Committee will be considering the Final Stage 1 Report and Final Work Program, on April 6 at 1:30 p.m. and will be making recommendations to determine the direction of Halton's Solid Waste Management System for the next twenty years. The alternatives being considered include an Energy from Waste System, a Resource Recovery System, an Export System, and a Landfill System.

The Solid Waste Management Committee recommendations will be considered at a special meeting of the Planning and Public Works Committee on June 15 at 7:00 p.m.

The Planning and Public Works Committee recommendations will then be considered by Council on Wednesday, June 22 at 1:30 p.m.

Interested residents of Halton are invited to attend these series of meetings. If you wish to be a delegate at any of the meetings, please make arrangements with the Regional Clerk.
