Three singles and an error rounded out the A's scoring with Greenley, Don Casselman, and Dave Quinn pounding out singles.

Roy Spear went seven innings on the mound for the A's allowing just a pair of singles, striking out eight and hitting one batsman. Dave Wilson retired the opposition in order for the final two innings.

Don Casselman and Gord McArthur carried the hottest bats for the A's picking up three hits in five trips. Greenley and Roy Spear picked up two each.

This Friday the A's travel to New Dundee for a match and Monday night they meet New Hamburg at home in an 8:30 p.m. game.
