# Present hydro petition to commission Friday

A petition signed by hundreds of Acton residents urging Halton Hills Hydro Commission to reverse its stand and make no bill paying service changes in Acton will be presented to the commission Friday morning.

Tom Watson, chairman of Thursday's public meeting on the issue, will present the petition on behalf of the audience of concerned citizens who have been circulating the petition.

The petition calls for Halton Hills Hydro to maintain all bill paying services in Acton as they existed until just recently, including bringing a computer terminal head and staffer Marge Loutett back to Acton.

Watson observed the petition is being taken door to door in older parts of Acton and is also in most stores around town.

He said the petition is filling up quickly, many have been filled and replaced more than once.

Watson plans to speak very briefly to the commission on Friday morning at 8.30 a.m. when it meets at the Alice St. hydro building. He expects some other concerned citizens will accompany him and also invites any member of the public to join him in attending the meeting.

Citizens came up with the idea of a peti-

tion to show that more than the approximately 50 citizens who attend the meeting Thursday don't want any bill paying service changes.

They felt the Robert Little School auditorium would have been packed if a story in last week's Free Press and other local papers hadn't announced mayor Peter Pomeroy had stepped in and was making sure there would be some place, likely the downtown to pay bills in town after September. Citizens felt many people thought the issue had been defused. The mayor's alternate plan represented a radical drastic revision of changes in bill paying services previously proposed by the staff and supported by some commissioners.

Citizens didn't go to the meeting because they believed the mayor's plan was the best Acton could hope for and it had been approved. Also, the rare lovely evening weather Thursday may have cut down attendance.

Citizens believe a petition signed by hundreds of local hydro customers would show the commission many citizens don't want any changes made for bill paying services here and that the mayor's proposal to have people pay their bills at the Town office downtown was only a second choice.

### Hydro office controversy. .

Lou Bonnette said he was "astonished" that Acton didn't deserve better bill paying service than a student for the summer, not that he had anything against students. When a public body makes an important decision like changes in billing operations in Acton. instead of listening to staff ideas they should seek public input first.

He urged the commission completely reverse its decision and leave Mrs. Loutett, a person Acton customers can communicate with, in Acton along with the computer. He said the commission was trying to save \$10,000 and was going to wind up frustrating customers to the tune of \$100,000.

Don Lindsay said hydro office changes won't encourage business to establish in Acton. Mason said industry wanting specifications and other technical information would still deal with the Acton building's staff, but admitted later new residents and firms would likely have to pay deposits and make hook-up arrangements in Georgetown.

Mason agreed with Paul Nielsen, who reported Acton Hydro used to help industry by bringing service free from the road up to the building but now firms had to pay for lines, poles, etc. Nielsen said this wasn't an incentive for industry to locate here.

Tyler said what upsets so many people is that Acton has witnessed a steady erosion of services. Council isn't here, the police aren't here, the fire chief isn't in Acton full-time, etc., Tyler noted. "There's been an erosion of the services and people we knew."

Had people got up and fought regional government as hard as they were willing to fight not being able to pay their hydro bills in town, the community might not have the kinds of problems it has now. The hydro building is all that's left, Tyler said, describing planned changes in billing operations as the "last straw." Having the works yard here was only changing the "direction of the parades" citizens have seen for years with the municipal works yard located in Georgetown.

Mason said he has argued against hydro office changes "from the start" and Allison indicated he too has been opposed to any changes.

To save a bit of money hydro was going to "offend" the whole community, Ed Wood said. Acton was being hit by an impersonal staff attitude and a lot of "snow" on an issue that amounted to a "slap in the face to us again."

Bruce Shoemaker returned to the feeling that hydro office changes were just another erosion of the "quality of life" in Acton. One thing has "slipped away after another." Various governments were removing services from Acton "without our consent."

A marketing study showed 79 per cent of the people who shop downtown walk and they come downtown for many purposes, including paying their electric bills and meeting their friends, Nielsen said.

Acton wasn't just "venting our spleen" Norm Elliott said, citizens were asking that hydro reconsider the whole issue. Having a little faster service because the hydro works department is in town was "neither here nor there." Moving the billing office from the Alice St. bullding meant another "government presence was being removed." Acton

everything now, they shouldn't have to call Georgetown to get hydro bill answers too. Hydro was trying to save a few thousand dollars and when the thing to do was keep all billing operations as they were for the "sake

of the community." Mason said it was 99.5 per cent certain there would be some place people could pay their hydro bills in Acton after the summer, and a resident shot back that arrangement

will last only as long as Pomeroy is mayor. Allison admitted he was surprised people didn't view having the works department in Acton as an asset. He said all aspects of the Acton-Georgetown split of hydro administration and works operations had been working well up until this controvery exploded. A resident fired back then there was no reason to make billing office changes in Acton.

He concluded the message of the evening was that people won't feel they are getting as good service as they were if they have to pay their bills at the Town office.

The answer was a loud yes. A citizen said people were happy with the existing service and hydro should leave everything as it was. Elliott added the computer and Mrs. Loutett should be left here.

One resident, who said she has lived here 10 years, observed ever since they came here one thing after another has been taken away from Acton.

Citizens worried Acton would lose everything when the Town and Hydro build a joint complex in the future. Allison said there are no firm plans now and no decisions would be made for some time, but allowed hydro must plan for the future.

Watson concluded a lot of minds had been eased by the mayor's comments and what people heard at the meeting. He said the audience was "broad representation" of Acton and Esquesing.

He warned the commissioners before they contemplate making a deal with Halton Hills council for a "tombstone in Georgetown" (a municipal-hydro complex) a lot

more facts should be made public. Mason said afterwards they'll be taking the message they heard at Thursday's meeting back to the commission and will push to have the computer and Mrs. Loutett

moved back to town. Allison observed the mayor's new proposal to have people pay their hydro bills at the Town office had obviously satisfied the bulk of the community.
