Road across camp belongs to Town

Town staff has been directed to look into what can be done about the International Peace Camp (IPC) blocking both ends of the road allowance crossing their property with large gates. At both Halton Hills council Monday and Niagara Escarpment Commission (NEC) Thursday, Dave Whiting said the road running from the end of St. Helena's Rd. off Highway 25 across the IPC property to the Town Line is an unopened road allowance. He said this has been confirmed in a legal opinion to the municipality. Spokesman for residents in the area, Colin Muspratt, observed some asphalt and gravel has been removed from this unopened road allowance and it is nothing more than a mud trail across the property now. He suggested the Town take steps to force IPC to restore the road to the condition it was in before the multi-ethnic organization started working on the land. Father Alberto Cunha, who went to the NEC Thursday to plead their case to be allowed to keep a construction trailer on the site, said they were told by the former owner the road belonged to the property and thus they were renting it along with the rest of the 240 acre parcel. First, when the construction trailer was placed on the property without a development permit the NEC demanded IPC apply for a permit and allowed the trailer to be kept there until the trailer application was settled. However, later the NEC went along with

Halton Hills request that the trailer be removed and the trailer permit application be considered along with the application to develop the whole site over several years as a major recreation-cultural centre. The trailer was to have been removed by May 30, but wasn't. After hearing Father Cunha Thursday, NEC again ordered it removed or else IPC would face prosecution. The new deadline was June 6, but the trailer was removed Friday. Father Cunha said as tenants they were required to maintain the property and it was taking a long time to clean up the site because it had been unused for so long. NEC member Robert Bateman observed one month was long enough to clean-up the land and the trailer should be removed. NEC chairman Ivor McMullin noted the IPC might be able to get back to square one and start off again on a better foot with neighbors and the municipality if the trailer was removed. Father Cunha rejected Whiting's suggestion that the site isn't totally or properly fenced. Monday night Whiting asked Town staff to look into fencing regulations to see what could be done about this fence, which he termed a hazard because it is one two or three strands of wire nailed to some stakes. Afterwards Father Cunha said the NEC wasn't looking at IPC's interests. Neighbors are fighting "what they don't know" and that wasn't the "right way for citizens to act."
