Stoop, scoop law

Stoop and scoop in Halton Hills became a reality Monday night when Halton Hills council passed an amendment to its licensing and registration for dogs legislation. The new law provides for penalties of not less than a \$25 fine excluding court costs, upon conviction and fines are "recoverable under the Provincial Offenses Act as amended."

The bylaw amendment states that "any person who owns, harbors, possesses or is in control of a dog shall be responsible for the removal and sanitary disposal of any excrement of the said dog forthwith from any private or public lands."

The Town is expecting citizens to enforce this bylaw themselves by having charges laid and testifying against offenders in court.

Citizens wishing to bring charges against any person for violating stoop and scoop legislation should contact the police or bylaw enforcement officer.
