



### Revise Citadel's light requirements

Halton Hills Site Plan Committee made some minor revisions to lighting requirements for the new Salvation Army Citadei earlier this month.

(Continued from page 1) recommendations indicated procedures were "proper", so nothing needed to be changed. Hiring of additional staff isn't planned,

three guards work a rotating schedule, two

at the beach and one at the wading pool at all times. Staff is working on wording for some new signs designed to make all swimmers aware of the rules of the swimming area at the lake, for example what blasts from life

guards' whistles mean. The Town must determine where to put the signs and how to fasten them so they will stay up longer than just a few days, Shepard explained. Swimming area rule signs being repeatedly ripped down has been a problem previous summers. Staff is planned to use heavier boards and looking at ways to fasten the signs more securely.

The only noticeable change at the lake will be the fence between the road and beach area. This fence will enclose the beach and benches will be fastened to the fence on the take side. No picnic tables will be allowed within the enclosed beach area. Shepard said this will probably please some people, while others will complain.

Life saving equipment has always been available at the take and is kept beside the lifeguard's stand.

"We'll be looking after the safety of the public," Shepard concluded. The Fairy Lake swimming area and wading pool at the park will open June 27 and supervised swimming is daily from 2 to 5.30
