**Residents charge**  
**Bylaw infractions**  
**at Limehouse yard**

Halton Hills council expects to sit as a tribunal sometime in the future, maybe as early as next Monday, to consider revoking the licence of Halton Auto Wreckers in Limehouse.

The whole issue of this yard's licence, as well as the licence for another yard, Watson Auto Parts, is up in the air. Bylaw Enforcement Officer Jack Lusty has been away because of illness and it isn't known how soon he'll have a report prepared for council. The matter is deferred until Lusty prepares his report.

Last week, Mary Shier, speaking on behalf of Limehouse residents, told Halton Hills general committee they aren't pleased with fence repairs at the wrecking yard and don't think the repairs which were made

just recently meet bylaw requirements.

However, lawyer for the auto wreckers, David Page, said his client, Fred Tolton, received a letter from Lusty saying the fence is in conformity.

Shier explained the problem of vehicles stockpiled above the fence still exists and residents objected to the Town holding off enforcing this regulation just because the economy is poor and the wrecking yard is waiting to reduce the number of wrecks for the economy to improve and steel prices to rise.

A number of vehicles, which residents claimed don't have 1983 licence stickers are still being left outside the yard and they felt they were so deep in mud they aren't usable. Shier showed snap shots to the councillors.

Page said his information was that the vehicles are licensed and useable. Councillor Finn Poulstrup said judging from the photos he thought the vehicles couldn't be moved. Residents said the vehicles aren't used and aren't licenced.

The residents felt the wrecking yard was the same "decrepit scene now as it was in January," Shier said. She branded the fence repairs as a "feeble effort". Residents aren't "impressed" with efforts made to fix up the wrecking yard.

The fence is nothing more than "dilapidated boards and rubble" and Shier claimed the gate doesn't conform to the bylaw either. Residents have tolerated the "morbid" condition of the wrecking yard off and on for 13 years, she said adding Tolton has shown outright "indifference" and "defiance" towards the bylaw, Shier added residents feel the Town has given the owner of the yard enough time and understanding.

Now was the time for Halton Hills to enforce the bylaw she said, there couldn't be a "double standard" with some operations following the bylaws and others not. She "urgently" requested council action, adding

**Police beat**  
**Front siding removed**

Sunday, they charged a 20-year-old Acton man with impaired driving on Mill St. East.

There were seven Acton people arrested for liquor related offences over the weekend.

About 18 pounds in British money, whiskey and a radio-cassette recorder valued at \$110, were stolen from a Duby Rd. house sometime last Tuesday. Entry was gained through a dining room window.

**Milton rejects**  
**peace camp**

Milton council's general committee isn't going to support the development of International Peace Camp on the old Twin Lakes property near Speyside because it is nothing more than a money making venture.

After hearing from a delegation of residents from the area, councillors approved a motion last week rejecting the plan.

International Peace Camp is actually on the Halton Hills side of the Halton Hills-Milton Town Line.

It has already been the subject of some controversy at Niagara Escarpment Commission and Halton Hills council meetings.

"It is a commercial operation," said planning director Bob Zsadyani, noting IPC's director, however, is a clergyman. "It's not a church camp operation at all. It amounts to a large trailer camp with entertainment facilities built in."

In addition to unfavourable comments in a planning staff report on the topic and the feelings of councillors the proposed use is not right for the specific site, the plan was also opposed by residents of the area.

Colin Muspratt, spokesman for the Speyside Ratepayers' Association, presented a 73 signature petition to councillors opposing the plan.

"This is a commercial type operation which conflicts with the rural intentions of the Niagara Escarpment Commission's plan," he said.

"There are a number of such operations in Halton Hills now which have been a constant source of trouble and the cause of a continual procession of delegations to Halton Hills council," Muspratt added.

**STRAWBERRIES**  
Ontario Strawberry Lovers Pie

- 9 inch Baked pie shell
- 1/2 cup Semi-sweet chocolate
- 1 tbsp. Butter
- 1 pkg. (125 g) cream cheese
- 1/4 cup Sour cream
- 2 tbsp. Strawberry liqueur
- 2 cups Strawberries
- 1/2 cup Red currant jelly

Melt chocolate and butter together, while warm, spread evenly over bottom and sides of cool pie shell. Refrigerate until set. Beat softened cream cheese and sour cream together. Stir in Strawberry or orange flavoured liqueur. If desired, spread mixture on bottom of pie shell. Rinse, dry and hull strawberries. Arrange whole strawberries, hull and down on top of cream mixture, chill until firm. Melt jelly, pour over pie to glaze; chill until set.
