The Brampton Real Estate Board, of which Georgetown and area is a part recently handed over a cheque in the amount of \$1,350 to the cause. The program itself was one that the local Optimists formed a couple of years ago. In each invitation to the June 29 Golf Day an accompanying letter told of how the DAC (Drug Abuse Committee) got its start and why.

The Drug Abuse Committee was formed in October 1980 by a group of Georgetown Optimist Club members and their wives who were concerned about the growing abuse of alcohol and drugs by the community's teenagers.

The main objective of the committee has been to try to prevent drug abuse through education and awareness while at the same time to assist those seeking help with finding information and counselling.
