# Out doors

The smile is that of a forever fisherman. There's no mistaking the pride of the young fellow displaying for the camera two wonderful Rainbow Trout that were taken on the Credit River just south of Streetsville this spring by Keith Montgomery of Georgetown.

One of the fish was six pounds and the other 7 1/2 pounds.

Reports are coming in of some very large trout in the Credit around the Norval area that have broken off more than one angler of late. It will be interesting to find out more about this. I hope it's not just a cousin of Loch Ness monster.

Lake Ontario is beginning to produce early this summer. One trio of anglers from Halton Hills, John Foley and son Darren and Neil Mason, boated 15 Rainbow Trout averaging six pounds, with one at nine pounds. They also had four others on the line that were eventually lost. It was one mad day of fishing off Port Credit.

The strange part of all this is that these lake trout were all taken on the surface with fish frequently breaking water.

Possibly these fish are a new strain, the water temperature was 65 degrees F. It could be that large schools of bait fish were pushed up to the surface with the trout following. Well, it takes a couple of good days like this each year to keep us all interested in the sport.

Foley tells me that the Northport "Niffer" was the lure which outfished the rest. Only five fish from this big catch were taken, the rest were released for another day.

Plenty of Bass fishermen are looking ahead to opening day, there is a tournament to enter in just about every area of Ontario with plenty of prize money if one connects with a decent fish.

A reminder to would-be deer hunters, licences are now available at local outlets such as Maple Rock Shooting Range. The licence has an application for antlers stamp, which is nice to have especially when one is yearning for some good corn fed version, not just a great trophy to put on the wall. Applications have to be in to the Ministry's office before July 29. Hunters who have not renewed their gun licences from 1967 or earlier have only until July 1 to make application for a current licence. After July 1 all applications will have to take the mandatory hunter safety course to qualify.
