No more levies for complex,

Halton Hills is going to discontinue the practise of automatically putting all lot levy revenues in the special fund to finance a new administrative building or municipal complex.

Halton Hills general committee reviewed a report from the treasurer Monday night, and then decided not to pass a bylaw to continue putting lot levies in the special fund.

Lot levies will now go in a general reserve fund for capital projects. Council will still be able to decide later if funds in the general reserve are to be spent on a municipal complex.

Pointing to a report from the treasurer in 1978, Councillor Mike Armstrong said he hoped all councillors noted that five years ago the Town was looking at a cost of about \$1 million for a municipal complex. A report from a consultant tabled earlier this year showed an estimated cost of over \$4 million for a joint Town-Halton Hills Hydro administration centre.

Treasurer Ray King said by putting lot levies in a general reserve council would avoid criticism for earmarking the funds for just one project.


