consisting of 10, down three from the beginning, flew to Vancouver and then to Ontario. His final posting was in St. Mary's, where they rented a big farm house about eitht miles outside of town. There they learned batik, aerobics and a St. John Ambulance course.

That was in their spare time.

Because the project wasn't quite ready for them, the group had to find employment for the first few weeks themselves. Always the adventurer. Roni accepted a job in a cemetery burying people. After two weeks doing that he worked in the museum doing carpentry and curator work. He then worked in a senior citizen recreation program and got activities going for them. For the March break, Roni worked with the town's recreation department. He invented "Katimavik for a day" where the participants would make themselves available to senior citizens for a day of work at a time. He received \$1,000 for his nine months work.

A brochure on Katlmavik describes the program as: a service to Canadian communities; learning to communicate in both official languages; living and working with young Canadians from different places and backgrounds; getting to know the country; living simply, conserving resources; new skills and new ideas; an immersion course in living for nine demanding months."

For Roni, it was all of those things. It was "fantastic".

And as one Acton resident settles back into life, another headed out today (Wednesday).

Denise Dilbey will be sleeping tonight in Abbotsford, British Columbia where she will probably be working with the handicapped.

Three months from now she'll head out to Fort Hope, which is parallel to James Bay in Ontario. There she will be working on an Indian Reservation and doing some recreation and restoration work. From there she goes to Madawaska, New Brunswick, where she is scheduled to work in a museum and build docks.

Travel is not new to Denise, who spent a year last year in Japan on a Rotary exchange trip. This past year she was taking a marketing management course in college. but realizes she didn't give herself time to settle down from her year away before she went back to school. She was restless, and on a whim, she decided to apply for Katimavik. She was mailing her sister Diane's application for the program when she caught the bug herself. Diane was also accepted and leaves in September.

Bike licences sold at arena

A Halton Hills bylaw states that anyone owning or using a bicycle in the town must obtain a bike licence. Failing to do this can result in a \$5 fine.

Until three years ago, the licenses were good for only one year, and had to be renewed annually. But new legislation in 1980 provided that a \$2 one-time fee would license the bike for the length of ownership of the bike.

The Halton Regional Police annually held a day for the licenses to be sold, with the last one being in 1980. However, police feel enough new bicycles have been acquired in town since then to warrant another selling

This Saturday at the Community Centre (the arena), two summer students from the Crime Prevention Office will be on hand from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. to sell the licenses to anyone with a bicycle, but no Halton Hills license. The serial number, make and color of the bicycle are needed for registration which goes into a computer in Montreal. If a stolen bicycle has been recovered a quick check with the computer will tell the police who it belongs to.

Those blcycles without a serial number should be engraved with the child's parent's social insurance number. If the number is known, this can be done by police employees at the time the licences are purchased.

At the end of the day, all the names of those buying licences will be put into a drum and a draw will be made.
