Yugoslavs get liquor permit

Halton Hills Council has given permission for a liquor permit for a picnic this weekend at the Yugoslav Centre south of Acton since there were no noise complaints after the July 3 picnic.

A report from bylaw enforcement officer Jack Lusty stated about 1,000 people attended the July 3 picnic and beer and liquor were sold from a "closed structure" on the property.

Listy said there were paid off-duty policemen on the property from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Lasty and the officers visited the Third Line where residents have repeatedly complained about noise from the Yugoslav centre the past two summers. They found the Third Line area was "free of excessive noise" on July 3.

He said the police received no complaints and agreed with him "that the event was being held in such a manner as to not disturb the abutting property owners."

Lusty said having police on the property helps a lot and suggested council make it a condition of supporting the liquor permit applications at all such events that off-duty police be hired.

Nick Cajic, spokesman for the Yugoslav centre, said this Sunday's picnic will only attract about 200 visitors and he felt off-duty policemen weren't needed, adding he couldn't hire just one officer because the police require that two be on the site. He said if police wanted to come to the property to check noise or anything else they'd be welcomed.

Councillor Pam Sheldon said neighbors weren't going to complain about noise, even if there had been noise, after the last picnic because they wanted to co-operate and knew the July 3 event was the big gathering of the summer.


