Hammond Sewing Centre got past Willow Lane Natural Foods, 36-27 in T-Ball action last Monday.

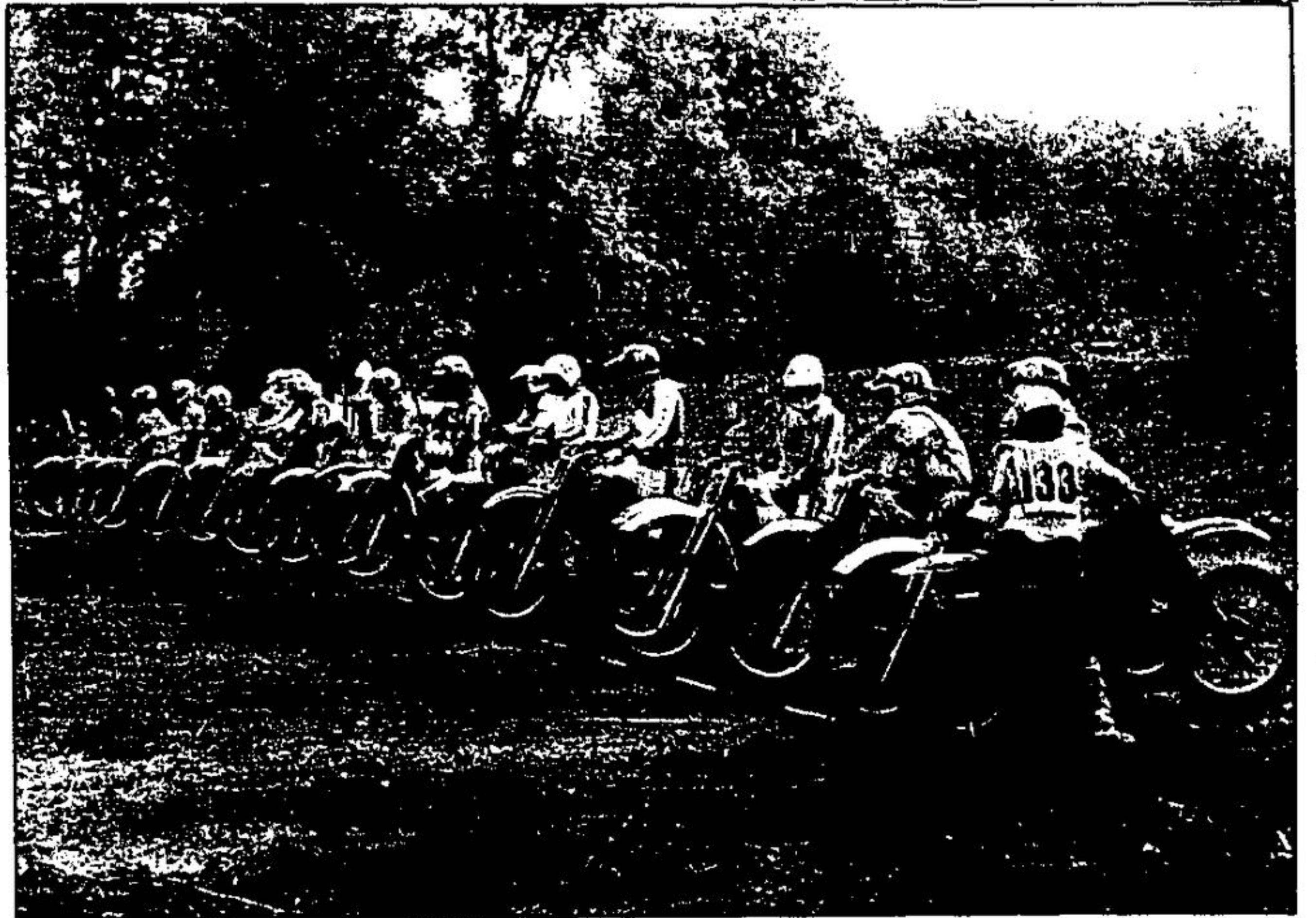
